**Peter, the Lord's cat** (1950 – 5 November 1964), also known as **The Marylebone mog**,<sup>[1]</sup> was a cat who lived at Lord's Cricket Ground in London from 1952 to 1964. He is the only animal to be given an obituary in the standard cricket reference book, Wisden Cricketers' Almanack.<sup>[2][3][4][5]</sup>

The obituary appeared in the 1965 edition of Wisden, under the name "CAT, PETER". It described him as "a well-known cricket-watcher" who "could often be seen prowling on the field of play"; he "loved publicity" and "frequently appeared on the television".<sup>[6]</sup> Despite this, it seems that no photographs of him are known, although his successor, Sinbad, was snapped during a Southern Schools v The Rest match in 1963.<sup>[7]</sup>

Peter is mentioned in the title of a 2006 anthology of Wisden obituaries, *Peter, the Lord's Cat: And Other Unexpected Obituaries from Wisden*.<sup>[8]</sup>

  - 2) Appropriate grade levels - toddlers-pre k
  - 3) Summary - This is the classic “Old Macdonald” song with Pete the Cat walking us through the different animals. The book features a few new animals that don’t appear in the traditional version of the song, such as, geese and donkeys. While hearing an old favorite, children can learn about some new animals.
  - 4) Review - This book is engaging because of the fun pictures, however, I do wish there was an added element or twist. I am not sure that young children would want to sit through so many pages of animals for an extended period. I also like the ending illustration of Pete the Cat with all of the farm animals standing together on the farm.
  - 5) This can be used in the classroom to teach children about different kinds of animals, and to teach very young children about the sounds that animals make. For older children, a teacher can set up a felt board, with a barn, a tractor, and farm animals that appear in the story. The children could create their own stories using the materials. Children might also enjoy a farm animal sensory bin filled with dried corn or hay, and plastic farm animals.
