I was very disappointed with this book; it was ok, but mostly empty. The only really interesting parts are the last three panels, but they aren't worth keeping the book for.

The mystery is boring and leads nowhere. The investigation is mostly ignored; that would be fine if the mystery were just an excuse for some other story, but there isn't any other story. The artwork matches the text: nearly impossible to discern anything interesting.

Where it intersects with Gaiman's Sandman, it makes no sense given how Gaiman's Sandman escaped from imprisonment.
