A debut novel, this book touches both in the realm of psychological and domestic thriller area. A serial killer is terrorizing young, petite, blonde women in the town of Aston. Known as the Aston Strangler, he becomes decisively more and more hostile as the killings go on - trying to find that thrill again. Taunting the police with letters while becoming increasingly frustrated as they continue to interview the wrong suspects, we see him grow more and more unable to control his anger. He takes out most of his frustration on his wife - his roller coaster of behavior confusing her more and more each day.

A solid debut. The author shows the typical pattern of a serial killer. The abrasiveness, increase in psychotic behavior while holding an every day, social job and the more chances they'll take to gain the power and control that the need now demands after each killing. The main stay, outside of these killings, is the relationship between the killer and his wife. He emotionally and physically abuses her and yet she tries to make this marriage work - not only for herself and her diminishing self esteem, but for their young daughter. Joanne does a fantastic job making the reader frustrated with the entire situation. Just leave him already! But, as with all relationships, easier said than done.

What I found most intriguing was the author's way of bringing in the victims. Providing the reader with a small background of each and every victim, we get to be involved in their lives - something not many writers do. I am the type of reader who needs more answers. I would've liked to have seen more fleshing out of the main characters - give me more background on the detective on the case... give me more on the killer and his wife so I know WHY she stays and how he became the deranged person that he is.

Fans of a lighter thriller without the twist and gut punches, will be fan of the easy read.

The prologue opens with young carefree student Kate Palmer, making the tough decision to leave university. Across Birmingham however we meet a woman also facing an uncertain and complex future, Alison. Alison, is married to a man only described only as 'he' throughout, he is a volatile, angry and controlling man. The scenes of domestic abuse narrated make for painful reading and fully display the control abusers exercise over their victims. With a young baby, Alison needs help drastically, but as we read her internal struggles we realise how tough it is indeed for victims to face the reality of their treatment and can relate to their belief it will get better. Will Alison find the courage she needs? Can she escape with her young baby?

Career copper, Jim and his police partner, Angela receive an urgent 999 call at midnight during their shift. Summoned to the scene at Aston Park, they find the dead body of a young woman, in what appears to be a sexually motivated crime, due to the display of the body. The victim is identified as local student Kate Palmer and Kate's personal past is dragged out for everyone to see, secrets and all.....

The killer sends letters and items of the victims, to local radio host Eddie Carter. Eddie runs a Friday night talk show on the BTH FM station. The notes are violent in their wording and show the true level of depravity in the killer himself.

“She Deserved to die  
she was a whore  
I’m not done yet”

The police are worried this maybe an attempt at a hoax and the comparisons are drawn from the Yorkshire ripper case and the Hoax caller who confused the entire investigation for many months. When more and more young women’s bodies turn up the media dub the killer the ‘Aston strangler’. Is this Birmingham’s answer to the Yorkshire ripper?

This novel covered a wide-variety of themes and I found that thoroughly engaging. The impact of the crimes on the surviving family, Press intrusion and police pressure are fully explored as the plot plays out. I loved the dynamic of ‘double lives’ but predicting which characters are leading double lives is never easy.

The novel has layers of depth, with a killer twist at the end! 4\*

Firstly, thank you to Bloodhound books and Joanne Griffiths for my early copy of the novel, it's much appreciated and thank you to Sarah Hardy for allowing me to be a part of this blog tour. Now onto the review!

I can't believe this was a debut novel, I've read crime novels by seasoned authors before that weren't this good. It's not just the quality of writing, but the sophistication of the plot that kept me surprised till the end of the book. This review will be spoiler free so you'll just have to trust me that the whole thing is very clever.

The story is told from the POV of several characters, a trend in the crime fiction world, and one that I think keeps the reader thoroughly gripped in the story. We hear from the police, the family of the victims and more unusually, the killer. I think this was a really well done feature of the book, often we learn about the killer from an unsympathetic detective - I'm not saying I sympathise with serial killers, this person is horrible, but it was better learning about their personality from the source.

If anything I think Joanne Griffiths made her villain sound even more twisted by allowing them to introduce themselves, rather than letting the police piece together the character. He's living a double life and goes to work like a normal man, despite the awful things he's doing in his free time. As well as being a killer he's incredibly abusive and that's always something that really speaks to me in a novel. All the characters felt very real, which is just as important as the plot in a crime novel, if I don't believe the people are real, I can't believe the story could be real.

There isn't really a dull moment in this book, it's fast paced and the changes in perspective cover all areas of the story, in a way that keeps things exciting without being confusing or hard to follow. I'll look forward to seeing what comes next from Joanne Griffiths after this amazing debut.

What a great debut novel!! This has got to be up there with some of the best authors. This does not read like a debut novel at all. It's written with so much experience and the storyline is truly magnetic!

Unlike other crime novels, A Deadly Game introduced me to the serial killer straight away, which I think made me more enthralled to read on – I was gripped. Knowing who was committing the devastating crimes and learning about their background and personality had me biting my nails. Believe me when I say that they're a nasty piece of work – abuse plays a major part in this novel. Joanne Griffiths has portrayed the killer so well, getting into their mind to truly give the reader a mind blowing experience of what 'sick' and 'twisted' really is.

The characterisation and character building throughout the entire novel is second to none. It is really laid on thick to the point you actually believe in the story. What a cracking book! I'm really into my crime stories at the moment so there is always a danger that they become too similar and lose the 'wow' appeal, no such worries with A Deadly Game. This gripped me from the start, there is so much realism to the events that occur, it is scarily believable.

There is a madman on the loose, terrorising his victims, rape that eventually becomes murder. The young women involved are all incredibly normal just going about their daily business .. the author takes us into the families, the helplessness of the victim, the utter devastation felt by the relatives as the hunt begins for a missing person, which rapidly turns into a murder enquiry.
