Spellweaver is a remarkable novel - a fantasy disguised in contemporary young adult, it's a true introduction to a series.

I really enjoyed the pacing and plot of the novel. Despite the vast amount of magic in writing today, Bridgeman still managed to keep the perspective unique. I liked how the story had a feel of taking place in a relatively short amount of time. That fully kept my attention while adding a strong sense of urgency.

Although some portions of the plot were a bit predictable they still worked so well that I can easily look over that. The action and suspense that especially rose in the second half of the book were not undermined. I also loved the explanation of the spellweaver and the mystery behind it.

The themes of Spellweaver involving friendship were very prevalent throughout the novel. So many reads

tend to focus on romantic relationships and throw away friendships. The bond between Jamie, Holly and Felicity was wonderful to read about. (Although, I'm not going to lie, I definitely wouldn't be opposed to a little something more between Jamie and Fliss.)

Fliss is a character the reader cannot help but root for, being strong - although she doesn't know it, and loyal - although she never quite had the chance before to prove it. Despite her heritage and situation, she acts like a real human being and not just a character.

Spellweaver is a novel that readers can devour, and will leave them wanting more.

This book is like a breath of fresh air. It is well written and crafted with a skill I can't help but admire. It has been a while since I read a book in this genre that actually held my attention until the end. The book had me turning the pages yearning for more.

Felicity's character is well thought out and for the heroine, she may come across as shy or timid/ a loner, but we are shown a glimpse of the strength that lies beneath. Her behaviour is justified as she has never experienced a normal life the way her new friends have.

Holly's character is quite interesting. Though she is extremely popular and social, she's well meaning and a real good person. This is a wonderful change from the usual popular girls whose only ambition is to make other people's lives miserable. Her equation with her twin, Jamie, a complete nerd, is fascinating especially as the two are polar opposites.

The story so far, as this is just the first book in the series, is interesting, it will keep you hooked till the end and when you put the book down it will be with the urge to know more. For a first time novel, Claire has done a wonderful job, keeping the language simple and sticking to the plot beautifully!

The various twists and turns and each characters' reaction is covered delicately with a huge focus to detail. It takes a great deal to create a whole new world where magic is involved and so far I think she has nailed it.

Felicity is a teenage girl who has recently lost her mother and has moved in with a father that she does not know. She is socially awkward with no friends so starting at a new school is also difficult for her. And to top it all off Felicity is finding that her mother is not who she thought she was. And then there is the mysterious Oliver, a boy not to trust if ever you saw one.

I found this book to be an excellent series opener. It is slow to start but this allows the author to explore the inner world of this fragile character. This is something that is done very accurately and made me feel that this would be a good read for a young person who had experienced a bereavement or is socially inhibited or both as Felicity does find friendship and we see her struggle to know make sense of these new people in her life and slowly begin to trust them. As Felicity's relationship with her friends begins to grow, so slowly does the want to develop a relationship with her father.

This feels like a good solid start to the series and the author has left lots of threads open for development such as exploring the father's character and getting to know more about Felicity's friend's family. For some reason I found myself comparing the book to Buffy the Vampire Slayer series in my head. There is something of the camaraderie of the young friends that seemed similar and the role for a mentor character certainly seems to be filled by the end of this book. However the over all tone of this book is a little more serious.

As a reader of quite a bit of fantasy of differing kinds I did find the magic in this book a bit run of the mill. So far there were no uses of magic or descriptions of magic that I hadn't come across before. Having said that this is not Harry Potter type magic and so will be new to much of the age group and as such would make a good stepping stone into adult reading.

Holly and Jamie were twins but they had this weird kind of relationship. Their parents were divorced, Jamie lived with their father and Holly lived with their mother. At school Holly was a very popular person among the student body but Jamie was not. He was more of a nerd kind of fellow. Holly was not real nice to Jamie in school or at least she treated him a little different than she did when they were not in school. When they were not in school Holly and Jamie were pretty close and showed their true feelings for each other.

Jamie and Holly both cared a great deal for Jamie and would help her with any type of situation she got into

which was not her fault. It wasn't her fault that someone was after her and wanted her dead. Why they wanted her to die she had no idea. She didn't know who or what these people were. In "SpellWeaver" we meet Felicity who after her mother dies is sent to live with her estranged father. When she finds a book of spells and is attacked by a strange boy with flames in his hands, she begins to realise that there are things about her mother she did not know..

This is a fairly quick and easy read, a bit of a slow burner but intriguing enough to hold attention and a great start to a new series and definitely one that I will be following.

I did really love the characters in this one – Felicity is socially inept (I know that feeling!) and has a whole lot of other worldly stuff to deal with at the same time as trying to embed herself into a new life. There is an eclectic supporting cast, including Holly the "popular" girl, who pushes the boundaries of what you expect popular girls to be like (kudos to the author) and a great part of this story is the yin/yang aspect of Holly and her twin.

The world building is solid enough and there are some twisty bits that will definitely encourage you to move forward with the story in forthcoming books – I wouldn't say Ms Bridgeman has done anything unique here but she has given us a well written, charming story that you can escape into and enjoy.

I had my eye on this book for a while since I first saw the cover. Because, let's be honest, this cover is quite appealing isn't it? But the plot also sounded something I would enjoy so, when I saw this book for free on Smashwords I had to get it and immediately start reading it.

Spellweaver was a pretty great start for a new paranormal, magical series that I really want to continue reading. Imagine a female version of Harry Potter but without Hogwarts and slightly different than the Boy Who Lived universe. You get a female character whose mother's death makes her move in with her father and start attending a new school. Meeting new people isn't easy to Felicity but there's a girl there and her brother who soon turn out to be her best-friends and together they discover there is more to the world than meets the eye. Apparently there's magic and a parallel universe where that magic is quite ordinary. And to make things even more complex to Felicity, her mother kept her powers secret and she's the new Spellweaver... meaning, she's far more powerful than a normal person who can wield magic and someone, something is after her.

This book was a bit slow at the beginning with us meeting this new character and getting a little bit of insight to what her life was like and her feeling to this new turn of events with her mother's death. Only after starting classes and meeting Hollie and her twin Jamie did the story really took shape. In terms of action it was slow paced and only at the end did you had Felicity really using her powers and the true magic kicking some butt.

Felicity was a great character that felt real. After losing her mother you except a character with no ambitions at all and with a hole within her and Felicity had that. At first she's quiet and barely talks and you find yourself wishing she would actually react to something. That was the only thumbs-down to her character. But, apart from that, she develops and opens up becoming someone different at the end but, at the same time, never loosing her essence.

Hollie and Jamie were amazing secondary characters that also grow and develop with Felicity. Felicity Lucas' mother has just died and Felicity goes to live with her father whom she barely knows. Sent to a boarding school while living with her mother, she tended to keep very much to herself. On the first day at her new school however, she meets Hollie, one of the most popular students who sticks to "Fliss" like glue. Suddenly Felicity comes to realize what it feels like to have a friend for the first time.

This is a lovely fantasy story with more than one theme. One of the themes is the importance of friends and family. I like that Ms. Bridgeman brings this important theme into her novel in such a natural way.

Hollie helps Felicity to settle in at the new school, and since they share all the same classes that makes it easy. Since Hollie is a non-stop chatterbox, even though Felicity would rather be alone, at least she doesn't have to talk much. Gradually Hollie starts calling Felicity her BFF and Felicity begins to share things with her that she's never shared with anyone before, and finding that it feels good.

When things start to get weird and Felicity sees one of the students hold flames in his hands, and then disappear from school, and then the school counselor has her deceased mother's journal and threaten her in the hallway at school, Felicity is glad she has Hollie and her twin brother as her friends.

I liked the element of mystery with regards to the school counselor. He really didn't act like a school counselor and you had to wonder what was going on with him. He seemed rather sinister.

There are a number of plot twists in Spellweaver and Felicity learns quite a few things about her parents and herself that she never could have imagined in her wildest dreams. I thought this first book was a good beginning for the series which is to follow. It does a good job of giving the backstory to the characters and developing their personalities. I did find the ending to the story a little abrupt though.

I enjoyed Spellweaver and I will definitely be on the lookout for Book 2 of the Spellweaver Chronicles. I gave this novel 3 stars out of 5.
