Here's the thing; Murphy is really good at cat descriptions. She's not so good at gender roles that are anything but very 50s, even with fix-it Charlie who is female but can handle a wrench. She's really good at interesting twists. And thus, her mysteries are quintessential beach reads: very entertaining, not amazing enough to re-read tons.

I love the depth Joe gets in this one in terms of being attached (without, of course, looking like he's attached, because hey, he's a tomcat, and he's got pride) to Max Harper, the clueless (but maybe not) cop who gets framed in this installment for murder and kidnapping. Joe is furious that anyone could not see the essential goodness and forthrightness of Harper. So he sets out to solve the thing, which of course he does, and Dulcie and the kit (who is not a character I like, just as a disclaimer; I find her superfluous and foolish) come along after to smooth things out and make sure Joe doesn't get himself killed--especially by the mountain lion who's sort of running along behind the main plot to make things interesting.

This is one of the first books of the series that really can't stand by itself, because there are a lot of references to Clyde's ex-girlfriend's cat nature that were explained several books ago. I would imagine they would be utterly confusing if this was your first foray into the series--I've forgotten that back story, so they were confusing to me.

It was good. It was entertaining. It was not riveting. Moving on to the next; I think I may finish out the series, just out of curiosity.

Earlier in the series than my introduction to this author and characters, we are returned to Molena Point and find ourselves immersed in a murder mystery. Joe Grey and his partner in detection, Dulcie have found themselves the 'parents' of Kit, a tortoiseshell kitten with a never-ending source of energy and curiosity.

With the Chief of Police accused of a double murder he did not commit, these two detecting felines and their

new ward set off to find the true culprit, while avoiding the dangerous Lee the cat killer Wark who knows that they can speak, detect and use the telephone. As the three seek the real killer, they also need to watch out for three escaped convicts, and manage to survive several tangles and a jaunt through the haunted house that is occupied by an even larger cat: a cougar.

Narration for this book is provided by Susan Boyce, and her clear enunciation and use of pacing and modulation before overly adjusting tone and adopting a voice change to delineate the different characters is a delightful addition.

Shirley Rousseau Murphy has taken the mystery and turned it sideways with the addition of speaking, intelligent cats that never quite lose that sense that they are cats. Their interactions, likes and dislikes, and even their humor is very cat-oriented, and while a completely anthropomorphic delineation and description, it works quite well. The mystery in this book was well crafted and filled with enough twists to keep a reader engaged, and the human characters, well not as well-defined as the cats, still have a sense of realness and solid voice. This is a fun series for people wanting a lighter and more humorous mystery, especially if they are cat lovers.
