I have no idea what I just read. A bunch of disjointed stories smushed together with some underlying theme of war.

One of the reasons I started this specific series is because I thought it was outside the normal DC Comics universe, to a certain extent. Why would that be important? It's important because I just can't read DC Comics collections any longer. At least not the current series. When there is a story it's very bare-bones, basic and really simple. Most of the time there isn't an actual story-line. Or at least not just one. Just story ideas.

What the heck is Lana Lang doing flying around in outer space? Why is Lois Lane green and doing evil things? Wait, why is she now . . . not doing evil things, but still green, and now in the Fortress of Solitude? Wait, when did Supergirl become a Red Lantern? These and other thoughts struck me as I attempted to follow along. I have a very real sense that I was reading an over-arching series. One of those things to be read by those who have read, currently read, and will read everything put out by DC Comics. At least, I hope so, because this mish-mash mess makes no sense on its own. Ah well. Something of a reoccurring theme for me. Attempting to read these things separate from the DC Comics universe and finding myself lost and bored. Like when I attempted to "finish off" Batgirl a while back. Didn't have a clue what was going on.

Guess I'm done with DC Comics except for things that I know are separate story lines. Not sure how I'll know. That and Harley Quinn. Quinn seems to be off in her own little universe, despite how I dislike the direction the character went, still mostly understandable stories.

Also - for the love of something or other: Stop with the bloody Brainiac stories. Personally I never cared for any of them, and they keep being dragged back into comic book series. Bah.

It started out decently enough. Good art at the start and a pedestrian tale that still wasn't too bad. Superman has been fighting Doomsday. Again. The whole point of Doomsday was supposed to be..well..umm..a Doomsday (the event not the character). So using him so much without causing a doomsday kinda defeats the purpose. But anyways..he's dead. Again. But he's infected Superman. Who is know doing some Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde shit (isn't it nice Soule is so well read?) with his inner Doomsday. Cool. Looks like this

one is going to be a tough one for Wonder Woman to deal with.

Halfway through the story-the art takes a nosedive (around the "Assimilation" story) as some intrepid high school art student takes over the duties. Cool (not really)..then as Doomsday-Clark fights Brainiac -it seems his dark "Doomsday" side has won.

Then uh...well the story with no breaks...no prologue..no this is WTF happened. Nope. In the next story "Metamorphasis", we find Diana being a soccer hooligan in Wembley Field with some 60 foot woman. Superman, fully cured, appears with a beard and the awesome "Stuck in a black hole. I couldn't find a mirror." Oh. Okay. Thanks Clark. THAT explains everything. Awesome. Meanwhile, while Clark was in a black hole growing a beard, Diana forgot to feed Clark's pet Little Shop of Horror's plant-entity (I am not shitting you) and it's rampaging around and Swamp Thing shows up.

Then it's Wonder Woman's turn and she gets infected by Nemisis. Rampages around for a bit and gets stopped. The art is nice though.

So lots of stuff going around. Clark/Diana get infected. Good art, followed by mediocre art and ends with good art. Sound awesome? Good for you-you'll like it more than I did. Since the title had "War and Peace" in it-I leave you with two quotes from Tolstoy's magnum opus that fit this story with the same name:

Clearly, this wasn't written with any goal or focus in mind. I'm also not convinced the writers/directors of this read or understand romance because the relationship aspects were basically just rehashed TV plot lines and shallow interaction.

The writing isn't horrible & the art is nice, but this is one hell of a stupid volume. **I'm not blaming Soule, this is just another one of DC's *event* fuck-ups.**

Why they do this is just beyond my comprehension. This *isn't* a straight volume about Superman and Wonder Woman. It's Superman: Doomed, but without the rest of the issues to fill in the blanks. You *need* the rest of that story for *this* volume to make any great deal of sense.

And the best part?

Save yourself a few bucks and just buy **Doomed**, because everything in *this* volume is also in *that* one. I'm halfway through it right now, and I feel like I'm doing a re-read.

Only, you know, with the blanks filled in...

The gist is that Superman was infected with spores from Doomsday when he destroyed him (which you have to read about in Doomed), and now he's actually turning into Doomsday. Wonder Woman & Batman won't

give up on him, but the government releases an aerosol version of Kryptonite that blankets the planet in order to drive Superman away.

Lois has been taken over by Brainiac, and she's got mind control powers now.

And it appears Clark drunk dialed her? Hmm. Interesting.

Wonder if this is the beginning of the end for our Power Couple?

There's a Future's End story in the back of the volume, and (once again) I felt like I was missing a huge chunk of the story, so it didn't have any real impact on me. However, it's wasn't badly written, either.

I just can't recommend that anyone spend money on this when they won't be getting the full story. If you can find it at your library, or borrow it from a friend? Sure. Why not?

But if you want to know the whole story, you're still better off just reading **Doomed**, and getting it all in one shot.

The only bonus comes from the Future's End additions, which I frankly found a bit of a snore. They assume a lot of knowledge that I wasn't across, and as such I found it hard to care.

Soule's writing and Tony S. Daniel's superlative art make the collection worthwhile, but I suggest buying the Doomed book and skipping this entirely.

There is a significant problem, that DC has had for years, with their Superman trades. In the New 52, Superman events are extremely complicated. They usually involve Time Travel, multiple Kryptonians, the Phantom Zone, and at least one character acting extremely out of character.

This trade has all of that, minus the Time Travel. It is still confusing as hell. The problem, and I am guessing this is a problem with the Superman/Wonder Woman title, is that if you don't read every issue connected to whatever Superman crossover is going on, you have absolutely no idea what is going on. A good comic can be part of a crossover, and yet still stay within the narrative arc of the regular series. From issue to issue, in this trade, major events occur.

Superman has turned into a Doomsday Monster.

The Entire Earth is covered in Kryptonite

Cyborg Superman and Brainiac are working together and are planning on taking over the Earth

Lois Lane has turned into some kind of vessel for Brainiac.

Non (the non speaking Kryptonian from Superman 2) and Mongul have teamed up in the Phantom Zone.

Superman is cured of his Doomsday affliction.

All of this happens within this trade, but there is little to no story connecting it all together. It is like looking at a corner of a complicated tapestry and having to guess all of the images that would be strewn across it.

All of this happens before the second crossover connected to the book- Futures End. They say that writers should treat every issue of a comic as if it is the first comic a person has ever read. Please don't give that first time reader this trade. They will believe the BS that people spout all the time about comics being a convoluted, impenetrable medium.
