Beautiful layout and color palette. Organized in a way that makes sense for kids. Games at the end of each chapter would help keep things fun for kids as they are reading it. A lot of science content and simplified for an elementary aged student / kiddo. It's written with a mid-latitude bias so some of the statements made aren't valid for everywhere on Earth. (More sunlight means warmer weather....not always, in particular in polar regions. - and - If you live in a very flat area, a tornado might blow through sometimes.) The copyright on the book is 2017 but they start the hurricane list at 2015.
