I struggled to really engage with this story, and it wasn't until the latter half that I started to like more than I didn't like. Overall, the premise is a good one, and I found several things about the world and the technologies interesting, including the main character's mysterious background. I also enjoyed the action scenes, the histories of the heroes, and some of the personal interactions between the characters. {SPOILER WARNING for the rest of review, where my dislikes are detailed}

While I appreciate the slow-burn of the physical aspects of the harem relationship, I was disappointed by the stated immediate feelings of trust and belonging the heroine felt with the harem members, after being rescued from a lifetime of enslavement. This has become an increasingly common thing in RH stories - girl with an abusive past of some sort says "she doesn't know why but she trusts these strange new guys and wants to stay/belong with them" right out of the gate -and maybe it is so, but it is the author telling us the character feels that way vs. allowing the reader to build an emotional attachment while allowing the characters to do the same, and it was ok the first few times but I have been getting a little bored of it.

Bigger than that though, I had issues with continual emotional scenes/reactions from all of the characters that seemed forced or not earned, as well as a main character who was insistent on not being a victim (which is nice) and her and other heroes demanding she be treated with respect (also cool) and not touch her without permission, but then allowing her to treat everyone else with a complete lack of the same respect. She touched anyone and everyone whenever she wanted and even though I CAN rationalize that, it bothered me that she continually reacted with acts of physical violence to various scenarios (not including the fugue state scene), for which she is lauded as a badass by the guys. I'm the last person who would ever jump on a soapbox about this kind of thing, but somehow I was turned off by this, feeling it was quite a double-standard, and rather than being a sign that she was a fierce heroine who was no longer a victim, it came across as violent overreactions.

On Goodreads' scale, probably found this book somewhere between ok and like, so 2.5.

Sanguine has an intriguing premise, but I found the narrative to be forced and the characters to be too erratic to be really enjoyable. There are mood swings left and right, unprovoked physical violence, completely abrupt scene changes; the whole thing is just confusing and disjointed. Most of the emotional actions of these characters seem totally inexplicable, like the author didn't have a clear personality in mind for anyone but just wanted a dramatic scene - over and over again. I lost count of the number of times a boy stormed off angry or upset and the MC follows. The jerky narrative improves somewhat as the plot points fill in, but the forced emotional extremes are a constant through to the final page.

At first I wasn't quite sure what expectations to have when I read the story synopsis. I thought, "wonderful a thriller or horror or even a basic paranormal blah." I wasn't too impressed until I started reading. And then it got real. Grasping a feel for this author's writing style was simple, the transition and comprehension were focused and easy to navigate.

So Sanguine or Guine escapes & is running for her life from the Vampires hunting her when she encounters Hunters. This is her viewpoint and I really like it. The Hunters are the elite; comparable to The Avengers or Navy Seals - basically, the all-time best warriors in both fighting, weaponry, technology, strategic and psychological skills.

So many romantic lead ins that did not have follow through; which would have redefined the story - and that's okay. Perfect story for YA readers and the action scenes of Guine exhibiting her Laura Croft meets Underworld's Selene is stellar. The imagining appreciation expressed in a form of stare's, gawk/drool &

I love those moments of Guine's appreciation. I may go back and re-read those. I did enjoy the mystery surrounding Guine's anomaly's ("Huntress" sudden fighting skills, speed, time suspension, tattoos, perception) as they are slowly revealed as we learn more about our heroine.
