Earlier this year I read Serenity Harbor, the sixth book in the Haven Point series. Instantly, I found myself madly in love with RaeAnne Thayne's storytelling and I wanted more. I wanted to go back and read the prior Haven Point books, I wanted to read the next Haven Point book, and I wanted to dive into the other books the author has written. Fortunately, I didn't have to wait long before I was able to dive into Sugar Pine Trail, the seventh book in the Haven Point series.

If the truth is to be known, I enjoyed Sugar Pine Trail even more than I enjoyed Serenity Harbor. I feared such would not be the case – I'm not the biggest fan of seasonal romance stories, plus Serenity Harbor had set the bar extremely high – and yet I was quickly shown a wonderful story through Sugar Pine Trail.

From the first page I was pulled into the story, into the lives of our characters. It starts on a high and the book only gets better. There are so many experiences throughout, so many emotions to work through, leaving you unable to put the book down for any extended period of time. I tried to blame my night of no sleep on my

injured back, but that was just an excuse I used to spend the night reading Sugar Pine Trails. It was impossible to put down, and I'm positive my neighbours heard my sounds of distress when my Kindle ran out of batter at the sixty-eight percent mark.

Honestly, I was addicted.

It's hard to pinpoint what part of the story I loved the most. One minute I will claim it was the emotion, the next I will claim it was the characters, and a few moments later I will change my mind to reference sweet scenes. It really is a combination of these things – and others – that make the book so good, one of those stories where the individual elements are great but the collective makes for an even stronger read.

As I've said, this book is deeply emotional. I was laughing out loud. I was on the edge of my seat with worry. I was crying ugly tears at the events. I felt everything. We really do go through such a wide range of emotions in this one, each emotion hitting you hard at the most perfect of moments. It was wonderful, making for a very real read.

A large part of why things felt so real, for why the story hits you so hard, is due to the characters. The cast is wonderful. I fell head over heels for our main characters, as they worked so well together. I also fell madly in love with our other characters. In Serenity Harbor I found RaeAnne Thayne writes a wonderful child character, and the same is true here. The realness of the children characters adds so much to the story, gripping you so deeply. Honestly, I loved this.

As for the events that played out – well, damn. There were so many wonderful scenes. I could list them out, but to do so would ruin the events. Just know you'll be on a rollercoaster of events, and that you'll love all that plays out. It really does pull you through so much.

Overall, this was a wonderful second RaeAnne Thayne read; a solid four-point-five star read that works perfectly fine as a standalone should anyone want to pick it up without first reading the prior books. I cannot wait to go and read even more of the author's work, something I know will certainly be happening in the future. I'm a fan now, and I'll be need another fix soon.

Yes I know it's a little early to be thinking about holiday reading. Every year, I swear that I will hold all holiday related reviews until at least November so I can reserve October exclusively for crime fiction, thrillers, and mystery reads.

However, some how a book always manages to grab my eye and I end up sneaking at least one holiday book in well before my November holiday kick off.

This book sounded like a charming holiday romance and sometimes you just need a little holiday cheer and romance.

This is a completely new author to me. I haven't read any of her books, nor am I familiar with any of them—let alone this series. As you can see, this book is number seven in this series. Personally, I didn't have

any issues with picking this book up without having read the others. It read fine as a stand alone, though there are hints of past books sprinkled throughout, but I don't think you are missing a lot if you just pick this one up and start.

I gather that this author specialized in Christmas romances after looking up a few of the other books in the series on Goodreads. So if you are a sucker for Christmas romances, I would look into the other books in this series. They read quick and have the predictable HEA and Christmas joy that one would expect from such a novel—and I love it.

This book was a little predictable and formulaic in its approach, but honestly, I didn't care. I liked this one a lot more than I anticipated. I loved Julia—who was the stereotypical librarian—and even though she was predictable, I liked her all the same. Sometimes there is comfort in familiarity. And Jamie—sexy. I liked him in spite of his flaws and I could see why Julia was harboring a lengthy crush on him. What did it for me was his ability to step up and help Julia when things got a little challenging in her world....I will leave it at that so I can avoid spoilers.

The story was fast paced and full of romance and Christmas cheer which was exactly what I was looking for. Predictable and a HEA in spades but I loved it all the same, as I said there is comfort in the familiar which allowed me to escape in just the way that I needed to.

I did want to take a minute and talk about the cover. The cover leaves something to be desired. I realize all of her books in this series have very similar art work for their covers. I found it boring and 'dated' if you will. I think the series itself needs a cover overhaul. Something fresh to appeal to a wider audience. For me this says 'old lady romance' and this book is NOT that. It's not erotic literature but it's more than my grandma's romance novels.

Very good book with a roller coaster of emotions. The story opens with Julia, a shy, quiet librarian, watching nervously as the person she has rented her upstairs apartment to arrives. Her gut feeling is that she has made a terrible mistake, as it is none other than Jamie Caine, local heartthrob and the man she's had a crush on for years. But she is determined to take charge of her life and not let her fears hold her back.

Jamie is the corporate pilot for Caine Technologies and spends his days flying people all over the country and the world. He has quite the reputation with the ladies as a charming flirt who will never commit but is fun to be around. He is very careful not to lead anyone on.

I loved his first evening at the house when he came across Julia after the end of her book club meeting. She was a little the worse for wear thanks to the drinks that had been served. She no longer seems quite so starched and stiff, and Jamie is intrigued but determined to keep his distance. Julia's life is about to change dramatically though, as she discovers that two young boys who have been spending a lot of time in the library are living on their own because their mother is missing. After calling a friend who is a social worker, Julia finds out that the boys will likely be sent to separate foster homes. Horrified by the idea, Julia offers to keep them herself.

Julia is way out of her depth but determined to do her best. Things are rough at first because Clint and Davy resent being removed from their home, in spite of the conditions they were living in. Luckily for her, Jamie is part of a large family with lots and nieces and nephews, so he has lots of experience in kid wrangling. I loved watching him connect so quickly with them. It isn't long before he is captivated by the sweet and kind woman under Julia's starched exterior. As Jamie spends time helping Julia with the boys, she sees a different side of him, one that is far too appealing to her.

I loved seeing the development of their relationship. Jamie is protective of her, something that comes out when he comes to her rescue when she has the flu. He is surprised by the depth of his need to take care of her. I loved his reaction to her bucket list, and how much he wanted to help her achieve those dreams. What

he didn't expect was how much he enjoyed bringing that kind of happiness to her life. But no matter how much he likes her, he won't allow himself to let it go too far because she deserves someone much better than he is. Jamie is haunted by some things that happened in his past that have convinced him that he doesn't deserve the kind of happiness that having her in his life would give him.

Once Julia gets over her tongue-tied reactions when Jamie is near, she discovers that he is a wonderful man. Watching him with the boys melts her heart and makes her wonder why he doesn't have a family of his own. I loved how quickly she tumbled onto the realization that he uses his charm and his killer smile to distract when he doesn't want to talk about something. I loved seeing her call him on it when he tries it on her. She knows that she is well on the way to falling for him, which will get her a broken heart. After all, a man like him isn't really going to be interested in a plain, small-town librarian.

I loved the time they spent together, with and without the boys. The ski lessons were great, especially Jamie's "rewards" for helping her up when she fell. If there is one thing I know about RaeAnne Thayne is that she can create a wonderful Christmas story and she has done it again. Sugar Pine Trail is a holiday hit that combines a small town setting with all their holiday community traditions, two adorable children that are in need of fostering, a swoon worthy hero, and an ordinary heroine that really isn't quite ordinary. Jamie Caine and Julia Winston may appear to not belong together but looks can be deceiving, and only love can see how very right these two need each other.

Jamie is going to rent the upstairs apartment at Julia Winston's Victorian home and comes to her rescue more than once over a short period of time. Julia quite unexpectedly starts to foster two young brothers during the holidays and is totally out of her element. When Jamie saves the day she sees a different side of Jamie and realizes there is more to this handsome man, and more desirable in her eyes. When Jamie began to help her with the boys and accidentally saw her bucket list, he thought it would be fun to help her with it. It

might have started out innocently but the more he is with her, the more he begins to care for the passionate woman underneath the librarian shell she shows to the world. A sweet romance develops and makes it a holiday miracle when she finally realizes that Jamie is the man she loves and wants.

RaeAnne Thayne set the mood for the holidays with cookies baking, holiday shopping and tree trimming. A romance between two unlikely characters that was delightful and very entertaining. A special bonus was seeing his family again and the other couples from Hope's Crossing. She also highlights what the holidays can be when you give back in small ways to make someone else's a little brighter for someone in need. I absolutely loved this story and with each new one I fall more in love with RaeAnne Thayne and the small town of Haven Point.

*While this is part of the Haven Point series, you probably don't need to read those before this one (though the one with Aidan starts off this series and that one wouldn't hurt). It's frankly more useful to have read the Hope's Crossing series first as most of the Caine siblings feature there. None of those play a **huge** role in this one, but it is nice to know details of the people you come across in this story.*

I really liked the first half of this story, though I could see the problems start even then. Jamie is everything I like in a guy with his confidence and kindness and caring. Man that's just attractive. Add the veteran with a successful charter flight company and it's just all delicious goodness. And Julia is lovely, too, with her introvert-discovering-herself determination and the courage to take on seemingly impossible tasks way outside her normal routine. And it's a good thing that Thayne does children so well because the two that dominate this story were important to get right so that we can see their effect beyond being mere plot-moppets.

Unfortunately, the second half of the story is lame beyond all reason with both protagonists having a heaping helping of negative motivation* with a side-order of inappropriate guilt and some relentlessly hanging on to past pain for dessert. This is worst in Jamie where it's just piled on beyond all reason. Haunted by an event in the past can happen, sure, but if you can't process and heal (or at least move on) after fifteen years then that speaks very poorly for your maturity and suitability for adult relationships. He really shouldn't have had to hear first from Julia that he isn't to blame and that he needs to let it go. But even if she *is* the first, letting it define all of his relationships since then forever is tragic, sure, but not in the way romance authors want me to take it—i.e. it's tragic because it signifies a person who is emotionally stunted and/or learning impaired. Time not only functions to dull past pain, but it also serves to provide alternative examples and perspectives that allow us to heal from the various rashnesses of our youths.

Sigh. I'm getting all preachy and judgy and that's never a good sign. Suffice it to say that while the events described might have evoked sympathy and emotional resonance a year or two afterwards letting them have such strong effect a decade and more out just doesn't work for me. Negative motivation is bad enough. Having it spring from such ancient events just enhances my exasperation.

So this was headed for a strong four, possibly five stars. But I had such a hard time with their respective backgrounds that I coasted in at a mere three. Not even the outstanding relationships with the kids could save me from the dispiriting effects of the main couple's sadly predictable interactions.

A note about Chaste: There's no explicit sex or even any clothing removal. But some of the kissing (view spoiler). Making it a close call on keeping the chaste tag on this one.

* **Negative Motivations:** I kind of hate that the term "negative motivation" isn't widespread, yet. Since it isn't, I'm going to save off this little jag to append to my reviews that feature the term. Jennifer Crusie blogged about it a bit back and it changed how I understand story. The problem with the term is that if you've never heard it before, you'd assume it meant motivations that are harmful or immoral. Not so. What it refers to is motivations *not to do something*. The thing is that many of us are motivated to not do things for a lot of different, perfectly valid and reasonable, reasons. The problem is that *in a story* motivations to not do things are a huge drag on the plot—particularly considering the fact that most negative motivations are overcome by the character simply deciding they don't care any more (or, rather, that they *do care* and are now motivated to do the thing). So not only do you have a counter to action but you also have a situation where to overcome it, all a character has to do is change their mind. Which means eventually, the reader is rooting for the character to get over him/herself already and do the thing we want them to do. Conflict drives story. Conflict between a reader and a main character drives readers away from story.

Jamie was the ultimate commitment-phobe, almost a bit frustrating in this but he had lots of pluses. He was a pilot, kind, great with kids and came with an awesome family. Jamie seemed to have a well-earned reputation with women and the looks to go with it.

The chemistry between the two main characters sizzled but although I enjoyed the slow burn, I did want a bit more heat.

This is my first read by RaeAnne Thayne, which might be odd considering this is number seven in the series but these reads do stand alone. I am definitely going back to number one because I feel the need to read about a number of Jamie's family that I met along the way.
