Then a chance meeting with a wounded soldier offers another opportunity - and friendship. But can Aletta trust this man?

Captain Jake Winston, a revered Confederate sharpshooter, suffered a head wound at the Battle of Chickamauga. When doctors deliver their diagnosis, Jake fears losing not only his greatest skill but his very identity. As he heals, Jake is ordered to assist with a local Women's Relief Society auction. He respectfully objects. Kowtowing to a bunch of "crinolines" isn't his idea of soldiering. But orders are orders, and he soon discovers this group of ladies - one, in particular - is far more than he bargained for.

Set against the backdrop and history of the Carnton Plantation in Franklin, Tennessee, *Christmas at Carnton* is a story of hope renewed and faith restored at Christmas.

This is a really good prequel start to the upcoming series by this author set at Carnton (and I simply can't wait for them after this sneak peek!).

This one is set during the Civil War, though most of the focus of this book is on the damage that war caused on the home front for the women left behind. This author is so good at focusing on the small details to bring home that overall pain of that time. Like the women reading the newspaper, searching for and finding their husband's name among those killed. A new widow still grieving the loss of her husband and also being tossed out of her foreclosed home. The little boy looking forward to getting a train for Christmas like his father promised him--a father that died on the battlefield.

This is a tough book. Many of the themes are very subtly done and would be easy to miss except for small moments here and there.

She has a strong faith that shines despite her hardships. She prays for others, helps people even when she is barely making it herself, and shows a great deal of courage. She is a wonderful picture of strength amidst great hardship.

"Christmas at Carnton" is an excellent story. I appreciate how Ms. Alexander puts a lot of history in, so you really feel like you've learned something while reading a great book. This tale shows the hardships women faced during the Civil War as well as Southerners. Being from the North, I don't know as much about the South and their side of the story. They are real people with hopes and dreams, some good and some bad. Most of the people Aletta knows don't even own slaves and they see the War as being more than just about the issue of slavery. Bravo, Ms. Alexander, for shining light on the lesser known stories of the War and making history come alive!

Content: I would give this book a PG rating. There is talk of a man banishing his wife's doubts that he desires her and then lying in bed and talking with her after the fact. There are hints that a woman who is behind on her mortgages is giving a man at the bank favors of a sordid nature. The word Negro is used, but not in a derogatory way.

This is a novella, a prequel story meant to tug at your heartstrings, and it succeeds. A story that is partially about the loss and cruelty of war, set in a bygone era, on the Carnton Plantation, which really exists, in Franklin, Tennessee. It is also partially a love story, a story of love, and loss, and opening your heart again to all the possibilities of life.

The details of wars change over time, place, but the despair, heartbreak, and worry by loved ones at home remain fairly constant. This story takes place as Thanksgiving is about to take place and continues through the holidays that follow.

Recently, before I read this, I'd seen 'Ken Burns: America's Storyteller – American Sampler' (PBS) which, unsurprisingly touched on his Civil War Series. Included was a narration of a letter written by a soldier, Sullivan Ballou, a Major in the Second Rhode Island Volunteers, to his wife during the Civil War.

Reading this story felt a little like listening to the reading of that letter. The reflections on the past, the uncertainty of the tomorrow, and the fears for the future, yet, it never felt bleak.

A lovely start to a new series!

Set on the Carnton estate in 1863 just outside of Nashville, Tennessee, in the middle of the Civil War. I love how this author ties together real people and places with her own set of fictional characters, making it feel so authentic. Her characters struggle with real-life problems--foreclosure, widowhood, single parenting, loss of income, poverty, pregnancy, loss of health--something many can relate to today even. They question their faith, but come out stronger for it, learning to trust that God has a plan for them despite difficult circumstances, especially in Aletta's case. "...even though she didn't know what the future held, she knew who held it."

The group of women who gather to bring support to the troupes are inspiring too, as they rally around each other and unite in their purpose; they were fighting on a battlefield of their own, as Jake realizes. The romance is sweet and tender, and though it develops quickly, not unrealistic due to the circumstances. Some

interesting history, plus delicious recipes are included at the end too.

I look forward to this new series with a little tie in to the Belle Meade stories. Readers who enjoy historical Christian fiction with a romance will want to add it to their reading list.

An excellent shorter Christmas story. Aletta is a young widow in 1863, partway through the Civil War—facing the birth of her second child, the loss of her job, and foreclosure of her home, all at the same time. For a novella this book is pretty chunky, which makes me quite happy! (Oh, if only it would be published in one of those darling mini hardcovers!...)

Jake has a new future to find after a head injury leaves him with impaired vision and an inability to shoot. It's devastating to the sharpshooter to realize he's no longer useful for the war effort. His general orders him to a house party as an ambassador of sorts, or as a sort of thank-you to the women's aid group so the general can show his gratitude by letting them meet one of the soldiers. He definitely didn't expect to run up against a fetching young widow and her energetic son and to feel his heart stirred by thoughts of home and family for the first time.

Aletta's son Andrew quite steals the show for me, also. He's such a vibrant and typical six-year-old.

There is so much I enjoyed about this book! Very good job, Mrs. Alexander. And I can hardly wait for that real-life love story we'll be getting next year, in the first book of the series.

This was a superbly crafted novella by Tamera Alexander. I don't normally enjoy shorts or novellas since most of them don't contain fully developed characters, settings, or plots, but this one sure did. I was completely immersed in this Civil War era tale, the historical details making this story come alive, and the characters in it were a delight. The angst was just right, not too drawn out but quickly resolved between two adults, and there was no OP drama whatsoever. There wasn't any unnecessary angst either, just realistic fears and qualms that anyone who had half a brain would have. The message of God's provision was uplifting and I am really looking forward to the next installment of this series.

Christmas at Carnton is a lovely introduction to the Carnton series upcoming from Tamera Alexander. Though it's called a novella, it's actually a quite complete story, with very little feeling rushed or glossed

over. Perhaps in comparison to one of the author's full length books, it's short, but happily it's a full story. Aletta is an admirable lead, pressed into hard circumstances as a widow in the middle of the Civil War. The mother of a precocious six year old and a baby on the way, her determination to find a way to provide for herself and her children is compelling.

Jake, a wounded Confederate soldier, is tasked with helping the Women's Relief Society with their auction, however, he is doubtful that it will do any good. Though at first I felt a bit cool toward his character, he goes through plausible changes of heart that really endeared him to me. His sweet way of dealing with Andrew, Aletta's little boy, warmed my heart for sure.

As usual with this author, the historical details are wonderful. I love that there are real historical figures included in the story, and I appreciate how careful Alexander always is in her Author's Notes to explain what is based on fact and what is more fictionalized. She has provided great set up for the first full-length book in this series, and I am already so eager to read it. If you have a bit of room on your Christmas reading list, definitely consider adding this gem. In fact, if you enjoy historical romance at all, add it to your list.

i am absolutely astonished. i sit here minutes after having completed this title feeling wounded, empty to a degree, needing to feel a fraction of the tenderly layered chemistry this title provides. this is so pleasantly poignant at times, other times it is greatly heartwarming and radiant.

christmas at carnton is based on a real plantation house (currently a museum) in franklin, tennessee, built in 1826. the mcgavock surname in this story is the actual surname of the estate's original owners. it is set during the civil war, 1863, and is about recently widowed mrs. aletta prescott. her husband, warren, is another casualty of the confederates. hard times have led to the impending foreclosure of her home leaving her and her young son, andrew, unsure of what's next (there's a little bit more to it, but you need to experience it yrself). cut to having found opportunity of temporary employment at the plantation house to assist in raising funds for the war effort, she meets wounded(?) soldier, captain jake winston, and *the. spark. is. set.*

this is a clean romance, which, to me, should be a given when labeling anything romance (i don't think people should confuse romance with erotic/erotica/trysts). it is also considered christian fiction, and, yes, there is mention of believing god will provide, but i wouldn't say this is slathered in sermon; i'd be up front if it was. this is my first tamera alexander experience and i am entirely enthralled to read more of her work (this was a #0.5 with three more to come in the series). this author has a gift for wonderfully captivating description of elements of people apart from physical attributes. an example is how she relates the class, dignity, and strength of mrs. col. john mcgavock (carrie), owner of carnton. an even stronger example is aletta herself. i usually get verklempt when i read/hear about the love that a good woman, mother displays for her family by any means necessary in the toughest of times. *christmas at carnton* was no exception. ms. alexander also knows plenty about the subject she's writing, as you can feel its researched authenticity complimenting the allure she captures of the conflict both in love and war.

this is also a civil war era title, on the confederate's side at that, so we cannot escape the topic of slavery. it was difficult at times for me to grasp i was reading & enjoying this title. i will say that this is not focused on battles nor slaves (all but one, tempy, the cook, had been relocated further south), but it's not like there's not a (wrongly captive) elephant in the room. even while many characters were not in agreement with slavery, and even with mrs. col. mcgavock removing a lady from her home for disrespecting tempy, a scene that i highly enjoyed, *still...*
