

In my opinion, true generalization of therapy is the key to success no matter what type of program you choose to run. I worked through all of Anthony's sensory issues using this book and by age 4, my son started talking. I kept using the book until he was 7 years old and thanks to the hands-on training I received through Waunakee's Early Intervention Services, I'm able to implement its practices everyday with children I work with and my other typical functioning children as a natural habit now. I couldn't recommend this book more...it was certainly a life-saver for us.
