This particular edition misses the mark more than most of the series. It takes the element that the Ultimate Series missed the mark on the most (The Green Goblin) and pastes it onto the character that could have been the chance to get it right, The Hobgoblin. Gone is the mystery that was the genesis for both characters, in it's place is the same overplayed family melodrama that has misunderstood the role of the Osborns in the original Spider-Man books. The Goblins don't have that evil goblin-esque presence that was so great in both of the characters, they've been reduced to second rate Hulk like Gargoyles. And Harry Osborn, the most misunderstood character in the Marvel Universe since the 1990s, has been torn further from the core of what that character originated.

Ultimate Hobgoblin had the opportunity to get right what Ultimate Green Goblin missed, but instead it sinks deeper in the same tired interpretation of these characters we've gotten the last fifteen years. It might be surprising to a lot of readers that these interpretations were not always so universal. Both the Goblins and the Osborns deserve different interpretations. I doubt it will ever happen for them again unless they can make a break from each other.

Peter goes on a real verbal rampage with M.J. This is somewhat justified, but he really threw everything he had into her face. If he were to feel some remorse for his actions, it might be more valid, but M.J. just was a huge victim in this book, and it was hard to see her cry.

What in the heck happened to this series? I really enjoyed the first several trades, but the story line is just dragging along right now. It feels like Bendis is scraping the bottom of the barrel when it comes to potential plots.

I only read this book a couple of days ago, and I'm having trouble remembering what it was about.

I've been a Spider-Man fan on and off since I was about Harriet's age. I stopped reading the comic regularly when I left for college. That was right around the time that the "graphic novel" was coming into its own as a genre. Comic book publishers scrambled to revamp their series to fit the longer and darker format. Now a younger generation is growing up on comics and graphic novels (I'd hazard the novels more so than the comics) and there are series aimed at tweens and young adults.

While my local library was still closed for the move to its new location, I was frequenting the Dublin branch instead. It also has a collection of graphic novels but the choices are more limited and haphazard. For instance, they have only one volume of Ultimate Spider-Man. It happens to be Volume 13: Hobgoblin by Brian Michael Bendis (originally issues 72-8). What an odd place to start but I thought I'd give it a try.

Graphic novels are a balance between the artwork and story. Hobgoblin has a good story. It has the competition between Peter Parker and Harry Osborn and the love triangle around M.J. There's also a crossover with Nick Fury for an added bonus. These things I liked.

I guess for things to be "Ultimate" the typical emotional angst of the Spider-Man series needs to be cranked up to eleven. Even that I can handle. It seems to be the direction the series has gone in recent incarnations.

What turned me off though was the artwork. Every character seems to be in a perpetual state of saying "Duh!" with their lower jaws jutting out and their lips puckered and turned in impossible directions. I suppose it's to show their emotional states but they look like cavemen! The treatment on MJ was especially unflattering. She's not necessarily supposed to be supermodel gorgeous but her artistic treatment just seemed cruel to previous incarnations.

The final events of *Ultimate Six* marks the last time Peter has seen or heard from Harry Osborn. After helping to subdue Norman and his four companions on White House grounds, Peter reaches out to embrace his friend, but Harry responded by promising to kill Peter and the S.H.I.E.L.D. agents who were involved in the takedown. That was then. Now, Harry resurfaces and casually walks back into Peter's life as if nothing bad had ever happened between them. Although Mary Jane and the rest of his peers all seem to think everything is alright, Peter is intensely suspicious of Harry, and begins to panic. And when Harry finally approaches Peter privately, he discloses the fact that he and Mary Jane were dating before Peter's relationship with her. But instead of harboring a grudge, Harry offers his continued friendship, and cryptically says to Peter: "All we have is each other... It's only us... I'm going to help you. And you... You're going to help me."

Although this turned out to be yet another 3-star volume, it was the highest 3-star *USM* volume I've read in a long while; if only the one of either the first and last issues were as strong as all the others (i.e. half a star higher), this would have been 3.5 stars. Somehow, it seems as if only the Osborns are able bring this level of mystery and danger to the table; aside from volume one, most of the highly-rated issues of the series are clustered in this book and in volume four (i.e. the arc with the Green Goblin and the Brooklyn Bridge incident). I think it should go without saying that the circumstances surrounding Harry's return aren't nearly as simple as they look, and they actually conjured up some of the most tragic and disturbing stuff I've seen from the series. I only wish Harry had been a more interesting/important person in Peter's life before all this went down; I know they're supposed to be good friends, but I never really got to see any important moments between them or feel their closeness. Even *Amazing Spider-Man 2* (which I happen to think was actually pretty good) was able to craft a pretty meaningful Harry-Peter relationship without any previous history, and had great casting for both characters.

I get what Peter is saying, and I get what Mary Jane is saying. Both have good points, neither were at their best. Like so many real life breakups, I suppose. Which doesn't make their arguments easy to read. Quite the opposite, at times.

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## **Brad says**

One part of Spider-Man lore that's eluded Brian Michael Bendis in Ultimate Spider-Man is the Goblins. The first Spider-Man movie proved that it's hard to update the Green Goblin costume and make it cool. Bendis decided to make the effects of Osborne's chemicals more physically obvious, more Hulk-like. It makes sense, but also makes the fight scenes with Spider-Man more of a bore. Now, the Goblins are mindless, not crazy. That's the case with the new Hobgoblin, whose creation and motivation don't quite make sense. However, Bendis makes Harry Osborne plenty tragic and relatable.

Where this book succeeds is the ongoing Peter and Mary Jane drama. The first issue, before the Goblin gobbledygook, and the last issue, once the mess is cleaned up, are much more compelling and brutal than the fiery orange monster in the middle. Bendis doesn't take sides in Peter and MJ's drama--both of them screw up, both overreact, and both have to figure out what they'll do next.

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
