Words fail me, and even though I took notes while reading, right now they are all over the place and make no sense at all... so please bear with me.

The first thing that comes to mind when you think MMM is sex. Lots and lots of sex. I mean, if two boys can have that much fun together, imagine what can happen with three of them in the same room, right?

Right there, that's your first mistake. If you are planning on picking up this book, you will have to think again about polyamorous relationships. For these MCs nothing is about sex, well not until very late in the story anyway.

I felt a very powerful connection to these characters, on different levels, I recognized myself in Don's need for family, Cliff's protective instincts and Howard's fears of not being enough.

Their poly dynamic is different from any other MMM book I've read. It is all about their relationship and how to make it work, taking care of each man's needs, making sure they each get what they need out of their relationship.

It starts in a spontaneous way, more of a friend supporting another friend in a time of need. And after just one kiss, all three of them feel their world shift. They are not sure what to call it, or how to make it work, but Don and Cliff know that there is no way they can live without Howard in their lives.

All three of them are very unique characters, very special individuals. Don has a sense of family that cuts deep; he needs to belong to someone. His family is his rock, and he can only be happy if he is there to provide Cliff and Howie with that same safe environment. It might kill him in the way, he will fight demons he doesn't even know exist, and he will have to ask for help.

Cliff is the papa bear of the troupe, he will protect the men he loves with everything he has. Always strong and confident.

And Howie... he will start as their weakest link. The one that needs the most, the lonely one. It will take a while for him to see that he fits, really fits with Don and Cliff.

Such an emotional, eye opening book. For me, their love, how they work to build a life where they can be open and sincere about their feelings. How they fight against the obstacles and stick together during the hard times.

Why not a 5* you ask? Well, the one thing that didn't work for me was how the story was told. See, it goes back and forth from age 7 to age 27, telling their story with different scenes at different times in their lives. So, it got confusing, and a bit hard to keep the timeline straight.

Don't go looking for the dirty, it's mostly off page, right until the end. And boy, do we get a change of phase and a huge surprise there. The slow building to that moment is totally worth the wait, enjoy the ride.

I am a big fan of menage stories but often I find that the nitty gritty parts of the relationship are smoothed over and it all seems too easy. Not As Easy As It Looks is the exact opposite – it does what it says on the box as they say because the relationship between Don, Howard and Griff is anything but easy.

The story is set over a decade in the lives of these three men from when they are in high school and just figuring things out until the present day when really they are still figuring things out.

If life had been meant to be easy Don and Griff would have been together as teen sweethearts and that would have been the end of it but Don kissed Howard first and that changed the way things worked out. Although Griff and Don end up together Howard is always around and the three of them slip into an on again off again relationship. When Howard is left devastated and on his own Griff and Don are there to help pick up the pieces and in reality things were never going to go back to how they were.

There is jealousy in this book, there is a feeling that no one quite knows what their role is, there are hard times and not enough money and it all adds to the stress of their reality. I loved that there was acceptance from their families – it was as though they were expected to be together and everyone was unsettled when they weren't.

If you are going into this expecting a lot of sex between three men you will be disappointed. There is very mild BDSM but again it's more about the reality of how that works between the three of them than it is about gratification. You can't have two people doing something in a relationship of three!

There are a lot of flashbacks as the story unfolds and although they leave you feeling like you are jumping in and out they are necessary and they explain so much about where the men find themselves today.

Four Stars! I'll give this story 4 stars although I am not really fond of flashback narration but I cannot but admit that the bits of past and present were so brilliantly woven to depict the story that it soon became one of the best aspects of the book.

Whenever I choose to read a mm menage I do it because I want to find out how the mc come together and merge as one, making their relationship work. It was no different for Griff and Don, who were best friends since they were 12 and Griff punched the school bully right in the face. What comes next is a beautiful friendship and later a blooming love (from Don because I'm sure Griff knew right from the start who he wanted). It takes some time and a summer affair with Howard, a laidback and flirting mechanic, for Don to realise that he wants Griff. They live together for ten years, all this time trying to coax Howard into their relationship when an accident forces Griff and Don to acknowledge that something, or someone, is missing from their lives. They are both nurturers and caring people, Griff being a real horse whisperer who

heals broken animals, strays, just like Howe.

I liked the dynamics of this relation and I liked the acceptance and family values that both Griff and Don were surrounded with. I loved how open-minded and understanding their fathers werethis is something so rare it seems unrealistic.

I loved Howe and I understood him completely with his need to reject and distance himself before letting the others reject him. It is his way of controlling what happens to him, thus making things hurt less. Oh, I understood completely his coping mechanisms and his reluctance to believe in any good for him after the harsh words Don said to him before their summer fallout. However, The author didn't quite manage to convince me how well the three of them worked together and completed each other.

Don't get me wrong, the book is beautifully written but it is the author who lifts the veil over those important scenes and moments from the past or present. You see and find only what the author wants. It's like a theatre play with one act after another and the curtain going up and down to reveal specific moments. I can't help but feel that I needed more when it came to Howe 's place in their relationship dynamics. If their struggle to get together and dance around each other expands over ten years, their final admittance and surrender to the love they have for each other happens really quick and then it's the end.

And the only sex scene which is described in detail raises some questions, too. I didn't expect the revelation that Griff and Don Make in front of Howe. And what does this mean? That Don couldn't completely sexually surrender to Griff because Howe was his first experience and loved him? Since Don and Howe didn't go all the way, He couldn't do that with Griff?

As I said, the author just gives us brushes of the whole picture in a suggestive way and I think this is where her talent lies.

It was the first book I read written by Jaime Samms but I'll definitely read others, as well.

For all the readers who have trouble with the concept of a ménage being viable in terms of having an ongoing relationship, this book is for you. You'll probably feel a bit vindicated in your belief as you witness the realistic struggle of these three guys. As the title suggests, there's nothing easy about the relationship between Don, Griff and Howard and the author puts all that doubt, jealousy, and raw emotion on full display.

The sequence of the story includes a lot of flashbacks. While I think this format was good in terms of providing quite a bit of backdrop in a short amount of space, I think it was also partly responsible for leading me to believe that this story was primarily about Don and Griff – that Howard/Howe really was more of a 3rd wheel. Don't get me wrong, this story really does focus on Don and Griff. I think it's the author's way of showcasing the struggle of becoming three; however, the timeline hopping seemed to skim over some of the time in which Howard was a more prominent figure in the mix.

One of the elements of the story that I loved was the unusual occupation of farming – it's hard work and a challenge in today's economy – the author did a great job of highlighting this. Additionally, I loved the strength of family that came through loud and clear, but also their vulnerabilities and flaws. And I especially loved one very precocious 4 (almost 5) year old boy who managed to make the big boys squirm a bit! Last, but not least, the little bit of dominance/submission that made its way into their sex life made for a hint of drama and definitely some spice.
