I voraciously read my way through both the Lei Crime and Crime Companion series to date. When I spotted this on Toby's website, I had assumed that it was in either - but what a pleasant surprise to discover a modern romance where there is an actual storyline instead of tortured sex lives.

The two main characters (Zoe and Adam) have both been hurt in the past in relationships. They both attend a therapist without knowing that the other is a client. Zoe (a freelance journalist) decides to write an article on Internet dating - and the fun begins. The location of Maui is beautifully described, but does not overpower the actual story - the island is like a character itself.

It was easy to see where Toby's counselling background fitted into the story - her therapist delivering statements which actually rang true in dealing with a variety of situations. The author has demonstrated her competence amply with crime novels. Now that I have tasted a romantic novel from her pen (or computer) I am eager for more.

Somewhere on Maui is full of rich substance and tenderness. Author Toby Neal brings her knowledge of Hawaii and its culture to this sweet romance. Our two main characters are emotionally open and believable, which makes their encounters with each other alluring.

Both Zoe and Adam are patients of Dr. Suzuki, a therapist on a small island. Zoe is recovering from her divorce and Adam is dealing with anger issues. Ms. Neal writes these two characters who, though scarred, are not tragically wounded. If there is a scale for the pain of divorce, 1 being unaffected, 10 being irrevocably wounded, Zoe's character reads as a three - mostly recovered. Adam's story is more deeply explored and his pain is more palpable, which I liked.

Through a series of emails, conversations, and chance encounters Adam and Zoe become friends. I hate spoilers, so I will just say there is one scene that is absolutely charming and it was this passage that bumped this book from a three to a four for me.

I think this is a great read for anyone who wants a light romance, not Chicklit - more Women's Contemporary Romance.

A Romance Novel?

Full disclosure: I'm a guy with very eclectic reading tastes, ranging from historical novels set anywhere from the 12th to the 17th century, to mystery, fantasy, and crime thrillers, to non-fiction, especially science and math. Also, I like to read more than one book at a time, typically more like 5 or 6.

In light of that, it's noteworthy that when I picked up the first of Toby Neal's Lei crime series novels a little over a year ago, I didn't put it down until I had read the whole thing. I've read the entire series since then, and have thoroughly enjoyed the way Ms. Neal makes her characters come to life. They come across as real people, people I'd like to get to know. With most of her books, I've been able to slow down more or less to my usual reading pace, giving myself a chance to savor the characters and the story lines.

However, when I picked up *Somewhere on Maui*, that went out the window again, and I devoured it in two sittings, interrupted only by the need to get some sleep. Once again, as in her other novels, the characters spring off the page as real people: both Zoe and Adam are immediately likeable, as is the therapist, Dr. Suzuki, who plays a prominent enough role early in the book that I wasn't sure whether or not she was going to be the main character. While it lacks the element of drama common to the crime series novels, it packs

plenty of suspense, as we learn of the various relationships of the main characters to others in their lives, and their developing relationship to each other.

Told in the same scene-switching style as in her other books, *Somewhere on Maui* kept me totally engaged from start to finish. To me, it was a book about two fascinating people and the way their lives came to be intertwined. With the usual references to the landscape of the Hawaiian Islands, which serve to add richness to the stories, I found it to be most entertaining reading. I have to admit that I don't have any experience in reading "Romance" novels; seeing the illustrations and the one or two phrase plot summaries on the front covers, I've always passed them by. It wasn't until I started reading the reviews that I realized other readers were placing it in that genre. I wouldn't hesitate to recommend it to anyone, man or woman, who likes reading an enjoyable and well-written tale about two delightful people they'd probably like to meet and get to know.
