Two sexy alpha males tell like it is. From basic training through Ranger School Owen and Tuck are like flint and stone--just sparking each time they come together. Flash grenades ain't got nothing on these two.

Now when you start reading the first viewpoint, Tuck's, you really think Owen's a bit of an arrogant prick--and you're right, he is. Somehow all that ridiculous dickheadedness gets twisted into gleeful irreverence when you read Owen's viewpoint, and he's forgiven, even if he still is a prick. Besides, Tuck can give as good as he gets and this inherent equality makes Owen seem like less of a jerk.

I have to say, I am and I am not surprised by how much I liked layout of the story. Told in a "He said, He said" format, it had none of the bore me with reiterating a series of events that I usually experience. Then again, it is deliberately done. This is an expanded version of the previously released *Battle Buddy* with Owen's perspective added, and his humor is an amusing counterpoint to Tuck's teeth grinding. Owen's side also gives some critical backstory that just flushes his and Tuck's character out. While you may wonder how it will end, you won't be disappointed.

Tuck & Cover is the combination of Battle Buddy and Tuck & Cover. Most of which is the same story told from two different perspectives. However, unlike most multi-perspective stories that I have read, this one entertained me from both. It didn't feel like just another rehashing of the original story. So, that is a win.

Battle Buddy is told from the POV of Shane Tucker. Shane joined the army at 19, mainly to get away from his small town. He knows he is gay, but he's never acted on it, and his family and home town certainly don't know, so the fact that he can't be openly gay in the military doesn't really phase him. At boot camp, he encounters Owen Bradford and he is instantly in lust. And Owen, to make matters worse, has no sense of personal space, so Shane is driven out of his ever loving mind. I loved the way Battle Buddy was told. Shane made me laugh pretty much through his entire telling.

Tuck & Cover is told from Owen Bradford's POV. Owen has the distinction of being raised to be the third generation of Ranger's in his family. His father is a Colonel, his grandfather was witness to the founding of the Ranger's - so no pressure, right? Owen also knows he is gay, but he sure as hell isn't coming out to his family any time soon. While not as humorously told, I loved his perspective, too. He was attracted to Tucker from the beginning and pretty much made it his mission to get under the soldier's skin -- mission accomplished, I'd say. Tuck & Cover goes slightly beyond Ranger School and has definitely left me wanting more.

This is a combined book. The first story *Battle Buddy*, previously released, is told from nineteen year old Shane Tucker's (Tuck) POV and chronicles his training as an Army Ranger. *Tuck & Cover* is the second part and is told from Owen Bradford' POV. A large part of his story recount's the same storyline told by Tuck. While I did like seeing Shane's perspective, I also wished that it was about different events.

All I have to say to Tuck is: *Dude, if a guy snuggles up to you, falls asleep with his nose pressed to your neck and wakes up giving you a quick kiss there... he's gay. Especially if you're both lying in a trench on a military training excursion-- he's sending you signals.* But, to Tuck's credit, he's young, inexperienced, overwhelmed and confused. And Owen Bradford is a force to be reckoned with.

Owen is supremely confident about... everything. He was born to the Army way. His dad and grandfather were Rangers. It's in his blood. He's also way more experienced than Shane Tucker when it comes to boys, hookups and sex. But he can't get Tuck out of his mind, is pulled to him.

The guys fly under the DADT edict; they live in a time when their careers are at risk if they are discovered. So it takes a while to get to their hookup but it is incendiary and the flirting and verbal sparring that lead up to it are lots of fun.

What I really like about these stories is that they are as much about the army training as the romance. And it's about the sacrifices Tuck and Owen make for their careers and for their country. The author has a light hand when delivering the heavier aspects of this but doesn't fail to convey the heartbreak of their situation. I hope there will be more stories featuring Tuck and Owen as this is just the start for them.
