While I like that the collection includes some personalities usually not included in such collective biographies (e.g. Gloria Estefan, Bill Cosby and Ellen Ochoa), numerous essays are about people who always appear in such books (e.g. Abraham Lincoln, Hellen Keller, Thomas Alva Edison, Martin Luther King Jr). Even though the collection includes people from various ethnic and cultural backgrounds, all are (or eventually became) Americans.
