This book is a unique read, especially for myself I do not often read medical thrillers or thrillers. It is always good to step out your comfort zone and try new things. So when I was offered a chance to read and review I thought why not?

From the minute you start reading your interest is captured and you are in for a adrenaline roller coaster ride, It is fast paced from the start and the author's writing style adds to this with short, direct descriptive sentences. He also writes with such detail that you can picture everything in your head so clearly. He uses his medical knowledge to make the medical facts and autopsies realistic and detailed. Which is always an interest to readers. It adds another dimension to the readers experience, however I would advise a strong stomach. There was a lot of moments where I was left feeling unpleasantly queasy.

Even though I have not read any of the books prior to this one in the series, I did not find it hard to get attached to the main characters. It was obvious there is history between them although i feel that both underwent a great deal of growth and development throughout the book. They were realistic and both became endeared to me, even to the point where I did start to worry over them. However as realistic as realistic as i found them, I did get frustrated with them. I found the way they dealt with certain situations a little contrived and the ending was slightly disappointing especially Kit's attitude/behaviour.

The stand out thing for me in this book was the author's way of giving the virus, its own sort of personality/being. The way he gave us an insight into it was one you would expect of a serial killer novel. The use of sections from it's viewpoint was genius.

This is a good read, however I did struggle a bit. It was in no way an easy read for me. I often found myself needing a break not from the story but from the medical jargon and graphic details. However I do think that was a personal thing and not a reflection on the author or his book. I would recommend this book to fans of mystery, thriller novels especially those of medical thrillers.

Right from the beginning DJ Donaldson captures the readers interest. The writing quickly grabs you and makes you pay attention. Not to mention it's a different way to kill victims in a mystery/suspense novel. The descriptions, especially of the medical facts or the autopsies were very realistic and very detailed. This definitely adds to the book in such a way that you can imagine easily what an autopsy looks like even if you haven't seen something like it on TV. Sometimes it was scarily descriptive, especially after just having eaten. But as long as you have a strong stomach or don't read it after eating, you're good to go.

The big picture in Louisiana Fever is slowly unveiled but the danger of the situation is very real and always lurking under the surface. While the threat becomes clear, the danger also is revealed and it's definitely not the kind of danger that should be ignored.

Be forewarned--this book is not for the faint of heart. While I was fascinated by the in-depth descriptions of the autopsies and the forensics Broussard and his assistants used to figure out the cause of death and search for clues about the mysterious new disease, they are definitely not for everyone. The mystery itself is interesting and suspenseful. The disease that Broussard is investigating and the mysterious circumstances surrounding Kit's kidnapping begin to converge, and the team has to work quickly to solve both pieces of the mystery. The New Orleans setting also works very well here. My husband and I took a trip to New Orleans this summer, and I was excited to recognize many of the street names and landmarks mentioned in Louisiana Fever. I got a little annoyed at the Cajun accents that several of the characters had, but I'm not a fan of written-out accents in general.

My one regret about reading this book without having read any others in the series is that Kit's character was not very well fleshed out in Louisiana Fever. Because she is either missing or kidnapped for the majority of the book, we don't get to see her character develop or interact with Broussard. I also felt like Kit majorly overreacted to some of the events that occurred near the end of the book. Sure, she just got kidnapped, but how old are you, Kit?

This was a quick read. The pace was fast and consistent. The mystery was interesting and unpredictable. It was less of a whodunit and more of a how are they going to get caught. As readers we know more about what is happening than any of the investigators and I found myself wanting to yell into the book to tell Broussard what he was missing. The characters behave like responsible intelligent adults that they are with the exception of Broussard's rivalry with the expert in contagious diseases Blackledge. However, the rivalry felt natural and didn't interfere with the work. While this is definitely not a cozy and is a pretty intense read it isn't an emotionally difficult read. Think an early episode of Bones or a forensic heavy NCIS. While this is the 5th book in the series I was able to jump in with this one with absolutely no confusion. I might have felt more connected to the characters if I had read the series in order but that didn't keep me from thoroughly enjoying this mystery.

Some of the autopsy scenes went a little long. I found myself skimming some of them. I could have used less detail. I also would've liked a little more sense of place. While the references were definitely New Orleans I didn't really get the New Orleans feel that I would've liked. This was most likely because of the nature of the plot. Quite a bit of the story takes place inside labs versus out on the streets.

Overall: I thoroughly enjoyed this mystery. While there are some murders this doesn't read as a standard murder mystery nor does it read as a medical thriller. Instead it manages to take the best of both and have the

story spin out in a fascinating setting.

To be honest, when Rachelia and I were approached to review this book, I said “yes” after only skimming the synopsis—mostly because I read “mystery” and was sold. While I’m actually not usually a mystery reader, I’ve been wanting to branch out lately in terms of my reading habits. Suffice to say, I was intrigued by Louisiana Fever, but had no idea what to expect in terms of writing style or conventions.

As I mentioned above, I had never read a detective novel before, and Louisiana Fever is actually the fifth novel in a series. It was not difficult to jump into the Andy Broussard/Kit Franklyn mysteries in the middle. While the two characters obviously had history, there was still character development and growth, which I loved. I was attached to the characters to the point where I was getting stressed out at certain high-tension points: it was absolutely a page-turner. To me, mysteries and thrillers have to have that attention-grabbing quality.

When I went to write up my review and check some of the publication details, I was surprised to note that it was actually originally published in 1996. I would never have guessed that! The writing is definitely not dated almost 20 years later, which is a pretty good indicator of how great a book this is!

I also have this weird fascination with disease and illness, so the focus on a virus as part of the mystery plot was really fun for me. There was a lot of detail in terms of medical developments and I enjoyed that a lot. (As someone who can geek out a bit in terms of morbid diseases, but has no clue about medicine at all, these sections were fascinating.) It’s kind of like a mix between Grey’s Anatomy and The Mentalist... which happen to be two of my favourite TV shows.

While I felt that the book started out strongly, it petered out a bit over time. The plot started to feel a bit clichéd and corny. I wasn’t completely happy with the ending, either—I found it a little implausible at times and I didn’t love how some of the characters reacted to some situations. Overall, though, I really enjoyed Louisiana Fever, and would absolutely consider reading some of the previous instalments in the series.

Broussard is the one working the autopsy of the guy when his assistant cuts herself. It doesn't seem like a big deal until he starts looking at the body and finds strange lesions on the organs. This story follows a medical examiner, Andy Broussard, and his colleague, and friend, Kit Franklyn, a criminal psychologist in New Orleans. After a man collapses and dies right in front of Kit in a restaurant after arranging to meet her there, the mystery begins. Not only is Kit baffled about who he is and why he wanted to meet her, Andy's autopsy on the man reveals strange findings that don't fit. During Kit's investigation to find out who this man was and where he came from, she is lead to the docks and questioning the shipyard workers in hopes they know him. Along for the ride, Teddy, Kit's boyfriend, accompanies her to head the investigation.

While they are still trying to figure what the "John Doe" died from, another body comes in with the same findings. During the autopsy an assistant cuts herself and is exposed to the corpse's bodily fluids. Kit goes missing, and Andy is none the wiser of the true nature of these deaths. The story only continues to get more complicated and bizarre and will blow your mind!

As a first time reader of this author and also this series, I felt pretty in tune with the characters, even though I did not know their beginnings/background. As I was introduced to Kit, she lives in a mansion rent free for three years thanks to a friend of a friend who's going to be out of the country for that period. Along with her dog, Lucky, they are anxiously awaiting her boyfriend, Teddy. Teddy seems like a pretty decent guy. Teddy seems to truly care for Kit, and they have a wonderful relationship. The only part I had a negative reaction to is when Kit fed her dog Lucky grapes.....the veterinary technician in me winced hard!

The supporting characters in the book were very colorful and even lovable at times. Grandma O and her grandson, Bubba, the owner of Grandma O's restaurant, were so sweet and caring, especially toward Kit and Andy, and it was pretty endearing. Also the fact that Grandma O has visions is an awesome twist! Go Grandma!! Nick Lawson, crime reporter for the Times-Picayune, came off sleezy at first but then redeems himself in the end of the book with his heroics, so I wouldn't walk the other way when I saw him coming anymore. :) Natalie and Guy, the medical examiner's assistants contribute a lot to the storyline, but I didn't get much personal background on them to be able to love or hate them. The simple fact that this book followed a medical examiner, so most of the time they were in a hospital setting, was pretty fascinating and intriguing. The build up of trying to find Kit and Teddy and to put the pieces together with the deaths was excruciatingly painful at times! Sometimes, I did feel like there was too much detail which, in turn, made it feel like the climax took longer, but as I neared the end, I realized if it hadn't been written like that, it wouldn't have felt realistic anymore.
