The Mothersea (and the Mothership before it) is a seriously good, solid science-fiction piece of literature. M. Renneberg has created an origin story that is masterfully woven and compelling. The writing style is clean, the pacing is perfect and the storytelling is engaging and realistic. This book is a prequel to his Mapped Space series, of which I have only read the kindle sample of the first book, but the tone of the Mapped Space seems to be a more pulpy space opera than the prequels. I loved this first contact story that as a little bit of everything: action, world-building, drama, military setting, alien psychic, etc. After reading the sample, I broke my (\$2.99) kindle price barrier to buy and read the rest and I never regretted it.

Another great book from Mr. Renneberg! I've generally enjoyed his novels. He writes, as the Brits say, a "ripping good yarn".

His world-building is quite good, his prose is ahead of the curve, the pacing is excellent, and the characterization is not bad. His aliens are not, perhaps, quite as "other" as one might wish, but he has put a lot of thought into them.

I know that I am not praising his work to the skies, but I do recommend it. I am picky about the science fiction and fantasy that I read. There are many popular SF authors who, in this editor's opinion, have very poor writing skills. Mr. Renneberg is not in that camp--I always have an eye out for his next book.

A couple of small nits to pick with this e-book: the first couple of chapters, while fine, are noticeably less well-edited than the rest of the novel. Also, the formatting was quite a mess when I first opened it in my Kobo e-reader. I played with the settings a bit and it straightened out into something reasonable. That, though, is not something that a reader should have to do.
