Wonderful map of the U.S. at the beginning. Pretty and easy to read. But Hawaii is way too far to the south. Love the framed portraits of all the birds that will appear in the rest of the book, state by state in alphabetical order.

What I wasn't expecting: funny, with shtick, that some readers will find amusing, some annoying.

This book has lots of trivia, on different subjects as well as different details for different states, with some history and pop culture, and a mish mash of other information thrown in.

I found myself singing in my head multiple times, particularly liking the Oklahoma page, and I did like the last, united, song.

I think many 7 or 8 to 10 or 11 year olds will find this book hilarious as well as informative.

The illustrations are very busy, very detailed, and contribute much text to the book. I think most kids will be attracted to them.

I would have loved this book from ages 8 to 10 or so. I'd have poured over it thoroughly and repeatedly.

United Tweets of America is a well done project, full of beautiful illustrations and state trivia, along with plenty of bird-related humor.

The premise is that the all the state birds are coming together for a pageant in the style of Miss America with the bald eagle as the Master of Ceremonies. The various personalities of the birds and their differences provide enough material to keep you interested up to the hilarious dramatic climax, which is closely followed by a warm-hearted conclusion.

It deserves a high rating but not because it has an encyclopedic compilation of state trivia. However the state trivia that is included is presented in a way that will keep your interest and perhaps encourage further reading and researching on the subject. It's the kind of book that can be enjoyed and appreciated by children and adults alike.

This picture book gives information about the state bird for each state along with a few facts about her bird and state, presenting that information as though the birds are competing in a pageant. It is informative and the style is pretty fun.

This informational text is very much like a reference book. It is basically an encyclopedia of birds, but it is organized in a very unique way: alphabetically by state. So in other words, readers can look up their own state and read all about that state's bird. If you read it start to finish, you'll read about Alabama's Yellowhammer first all the way to Wyoming's Western Meadowlark last. I love this organizational method because it is like nothing I've ever seen before! It really makes me want to read the whole book, rather than just pick out one or two birds. While there are no real photographs of the birds, the illustrations of the birds are hilarious. For example, Mississippi's Mockingbird is dressed like Elvis and Nevada's Mountain Bluebird is sitting at a blackjack casino table. Each page features a different state, includes basic state info, and a small paragraph about the bird. After each bird has "paraded through the United Tweets of America Pageant," readers will be sufficiently satisfied and exponentially smarter about the birds of the U.S. This would be a great tie in to the social studies curriculum, specifically 5th grade when learning state capitals is part of the standards.
