I debated between giving it two stars or three, but it's better than okay even if the writing is a bit simplistic sometimes. It feels real & grounded, and is the story of a woman who found herself when she (re)found God and saved her marriage after they had separated, by surrendering and dedicating her life to God. The parts dealing with her spiritual growth are not sappy or heavy handed, but then again it's not as deep as I was sort of looking for either. Her list of resources is good, and would be especially helpful to newer Christians.

In addition, it's a book about being married to country star Alan Jackson & his career (and their accumulation of expensive "stuff") and working on their marriage. If you're an Alan Jackson fan, you'll like it. I was surprised to learn that he cheated on her (he always seemed so shy and dedicated), and even more surprised to learn about it in an almost throw away fashion after chapters dedicated to her perceived failings as the wife he needed. She was very honest about her codependency issues.

I'm still ambivalent about the book. It's a fast read. Some will love it. I guess I just expected more (& maybe less dwelling on extravagant material goods), though it's really not bad either...

I enjoyed this book, even though I felt like the author could've gone into a lot more depth on some subjects. (Her brother's suicide clearly changed the trajectory of her life, but he is only mentioned twice throughout the book). It isn't some dishy celeb bio about Alan Jackson and his troubled marriage. It is, however, a sincere look at her life from the wife of a man who is in the spotlight. Denise writes about her life growing up in a small town, meeting Alan, and their marriage at a young age. These things affected her perception of what their marriage should be like and her attitude toward marriage in general. As tragedy struck, her heart was opened toward living a God-centered life with her husband.

This book was grounded and real. Denise takes responsibility for at least some of the issues in her marriage, but also doesn't let Alan off the hook either. Now, they both play an active role in sustaining their marriage through faith. This is an affirmative read, one that makes me wish she had delved a little deeper. The writing was just a bit too simple. Although her issues are not the same as mine in my marriage, it inspires me to try to focus on God as the creator and sustainer of marriage.
