No he sido capaz de disfrutar de este libro, lo he encontrado excesivamente duro y cruel para ser un romance. La escena con la que abre ya me dejó un poco desmotivada (odio las escenas de violaciones) pero intenté seguir adelante por si la historia se ponía mejor...y no fue así. I have not been able to enjoy this book; I found it too harsh and cruel to be a romance. The scene which the story begins already left me a little unmotivated (I hate rape scenes) but I tried to go ahead as it is the story got better... and it did not.

I found the romance too hasty and not credible... I do not believe that this situation could be really happening at that time and, especially, with the heroine's past, she couldn't have consented it.

It has many repetitions of the first scene, very unpleasant, for its colorful details, much drama (melodrama), many injustices and much unwarranted death... the accident was horrible for itself, I don't think it was required to add all the death that the author did.

It is not my idea of a good romance a book so depressing that not even the good things that happen get to cheer it up. A pity, because there are very beautiful relationships among the children and the hero or with her neighbors, but everything is cooled with each abuse that the author describes... was really needed that final scene? I will not write spoilers but it was brutal (again). I don't think that so much violence belongs into a romance. Sorry!

This is the second book in the Green Valley series by MS Shoup. The book tells the story of one woman's determination to find a better place for her children. Pauline Ray has had enough of her abusive husband so

she escapes to Virginia to be someone else. Pauline knows that being "Lizzy" will be an undertaking with only \$34.00 to her name. Her new found acquaintance in town explains why she should be the unknown daughter of a deceased man who has a farm. You see, Lizzy in doing this has to come up with the taxes to move into her new home. She doesn't know the first thing about being a farmer. But with the help of a man who works in a mine, she finds a love of a lifetime. There are secrets on both sides of the coin and the challenges they will face together.

I liked this book and was glad to catch up with Em and Tommy Medlin who have a family and love from previous "Down in the Valley".

The story kinda dragged for me in which I skipped some parts. Maybe I'm too picky, expecting more in the book than the author had to give. But not being an expert in these things, I hope the next one will be change my tune.

Set in the mining state of Virginia in the 1800's, Paulina Ray is running away from an abusive husband with her two children. Was it good luck or divine intervention that she ended up at the doorstep of two sisters that gave her an opportunity for a fresh start with a new identity as Lizzie, the long lost daughter of Mr. Greenway who passed away and left everything to his "daughter". With the encouragement of her new friends and her new identity births a new fight in her that she never knew she had.

Jeremy Sheffield has his eye on Paulina (Lizzie) . When he offers to help her, their relationship turns to something more. Will they be able to trust each other with the past they are both running from?
