Ebony has always known that she was different, but her parents have never been open to talking about her and their family. When Ebony finally forces her parents to talk to her, they tell her something she wasn't expecting – she's not their biological daughter.

Jordan is a normal kid who has not had the best of starts in life. He's currently in foster care after his parents died, and has even spent time in a juvenile detention facility. When he meets Ebony he is intrigued by her violet eyes, but he has other problems when an old friend tries to kill him.

Ebony sets out with the intention of finding the man who gave her to her parents, even though they told her that they'll be in danger if anyone discovers that they have told her her true heritage, and then her parent's house explodes and burns to the ground.

Jordan survives his stabbing, and is then visited by an angel called Nathaneal, who tells him that it's now his job to help find a girl called Ebrielle who is really an angel, who was stolen at birth.

Is Ebony Ebrielle? What do the angels want with her? And what happened to Ebony's real parents?

I thought this book was okay in the beginning, but the further I got into it, the more unbelievable it became, and the more I felt like I was forcing myself to read on.

Ebony was an okay character, but she was a little stupid at times. She totally didn't take what her parents were telling her seriously, and the first chance she got she went against what they had told her, and not only that, but she led her best friend into danger as well.

When she was told that her parents are most likely dead, she just argued! I know denial is a stage of grief, but to point blank refuse to accept even the possibility that they are dead, when she knows that they were threatened should they ever tell her about her unusual heritage, their house exploded and burned to the ground, their car was in the garage, and there are no records of them travelling anywhere is a little unbelievable for me.

Jordan was another okay character, but he was pretty spineless. He didn't accept what he was told by the angels initially, but he didn't take much convincing. He was even pleased to go with Nathaneal when he realised he drove a Lamborghini! He didn't immediately think of Ebony and her violet eyes and her super strength when he was told he was looking for a missing angel named Ebrielle either which seemed a little dense.

I found it really difficult to connect with either Ebony or Jordan, they were both just dull, a little self-centred, and didn't make good decisions.

The storyline was okay, but I have to say that I was bored. Some parts were just unbelievable, other parts cliché, and the info dumps drove me crazy.

When Nathaneal started explaining exactly what was going on to Jordan I seriously considered not carrying on reading. It was such a massive info dump! The last book that was like this that I can remember was 'Undeadly', and this was no different – it was like reading an encyclopaedia. I don't know about you, but I

find encyclopaedias pretty dull unless it's a subject I'm really interested in, and I really wasn't interested enough in this book to appreciate this giant history lesson!

Jordan got quite a few sermons like this from Nathaneal, and they were all pretty bad. If I had been Jordan being told all this stuff I would probably have fallen asleep.

Then there's a blo\*dy love triangle! I mean please?! First Ebony is instantly attracted to Jordan, and then Nathaneal makes some kind of move! As if this book wasn't bad enough already, the author throws in a love triangle! I received a copy of this in the post from the publisher in exchange for an honest review. Actually receiving this was a surprise, but an awesome one. I loved reading her 'Guardians of Time' trilogy as a teenager and I still have them on my shelves, but she disappeared and I wondered why, then I got this book and I was really excited. There was an accompanying note explaining her absence for the last 7 years and reading her story made me admire her all the more.

Anyway, I knew I wanted to read this as soon as I could, I had a feeling I would really enjoy it but I was also a little bit nervous. I am older now (obviously) and my tastes have changed quite a bit, what if it wasn't as good as I remember her writing being? Nevertheless I got stuck in and I am happy to say my fears were unfounded, I found myself captivated by the story and wanting to know more. The characters and their world grabbed me quickly and pulled me in.

This book is told in first person but from two different people. Chapters alternate between them but they do feature in each others chapters which adds an extra dimension to it all. Ebony has always been sheltered - her parents not letting her do anything, no going out, having fun, they even homeschooled her for a while, but now she is sixteen and wants more from life. She is thankfully now at school, but still not allowed to do things 'normal' kids are doing, but it's all starting to change.

I quite liked Ebony as a character but I found her story fairly predictable, I could see how things were linked and layed out - however I think that was at least partly deliberate. I did still find myself liking her - she has a noble heart and tries to think of others before herself, she doesn't break down when things go wrong but tries to carry on.

Then we meet Jordan, his life is basically the exact opposite - a kid gone through the care system with some bad memories and things that still haunt him, His story makes your heart ache and you can't help but want him to find happiness. I think he is probably my favourite character in this book. Even after all the rubbish he's gone through he still tries to help Ebony and make things right in the world. He has a strong inner strength and I just felt drawn to him.

As the blurb says, this is a story about finding the stolen angel, I've seen a few books recently focusing on angels and I'm never sure what to make of them, some I've read and really enjoyed, others I haven't but this one was well set up, had great 'history' to the story and was actually very believable as a concept and storyline.

There are quite a few characters but they all bring something to the storyline and help speed the pace and plot. There is a real sense of mystery particularly on Jordan's past and then both of their futures, it makes you want to read more just so you can find out more.

I really wanted to like this book. I can't even describe how much. I love Marianne Curley, I love her Guardians of Time trilogy as it is one of the first novels I've read and it is my definite favourite on my shelves. But no matter how much I tried, I couldn't get into 'Hidden'. It wasn't bad. Not at all. It was just okay, and unfortunately, I had very high expectations. In 'The Named', I loved every single character. They were all unique, different and loveable. But the only character in this novel that I really liked, was Jordan.

Jordan was funny and he was easy to warm up to, and I was definitely rooting for him more than for Thane for sure. Jordan was the only thing I loved about this novel. Ebony was bland to me, she had a personality and wasn't a Mary Sue but she didn't seem to have any other emotions other than sarcastic, disbelieving or just neutral, and the way she treated Jordan, was exactly like how you would treat your loved dog, it was kind of condescending, especially because he loves her. Thane was probably the least likeable character in the book. He was the typical Adonis, who has supposed to be sexy, sensitive, loving and just plain perfect. And that was exactly what he was. He was too good, he had no flaws, no insecurities and wasn't interesting or compelling in any way.

And now I talk about the love triangle: Noooooooooo.

Jordan loves Ebony, and initially I was sure that Ebony loved Jordan, believe me, it certainly seemed that way, and I was pleased I thought: Finally here's two characters that are drawn to each other when they first meet but don't love each other in the instant die hard way I read a lot and they don't start babbling on about how attractive the other is for ten pages. I was excited to read a developed romance.

## SUMMARY

Ebony is a sheltered, naïve sixteen year old who doesn't know she is really a kidnapped angel, hidden away in a valley while her real family searches for her. When she bumps into her charge outside a nightclub, the good guys finally find her, and now they have to convince her to return to Avena before the evil dark prince comes to claim her as his bride.

## WORLDBUILDING

The worldbuilding was light on: there was no explanation of where angels come from or if they are related to God. While humans have free will, angels fall in love and marry, so they're not the traditional Christian interpretation of angels. Ebony is even raised as an atheist and has a hard time accepting that she is an angel.

While the story was set in the real world, there were numerous references to other realms and dimensional teleportation portals the angels use to travel between those realms. One of the thing I did like is that only people who can fly can travel between the portals, so until Ebony grows her wings, she's stuck on Earth. The other thing I liked was that the setting was so clearly Australian. It was cool to see an angel battle in the Australia bush.

## CHARACTERS + RELATIONSHIPS

The relationships really took the cheap and easy way out: Ebony and Jordan have this special 'bond' courtesy of being Guardian Angel and charge, while Ebony and Nathaniel (Thane) have a special bond because they are destined to marry. There was no building of these close bonds, they just suddenly erupted into being. Similarly, Ebony's best friend Amber was her best friend long before the opening page, and although I liked seeing Amber being protective towards her best friend, I just kind of felt that she was there so Ebony wasn't surrounded by masculine energy all the time.

## WHAT WORKED/DIDN'T WORK

The romance failed. Jordan seemed to think he was in love with Ebony while everyone thought he wanted Sophia. Thane was creepy but after her initial hesitation (because trusting Thane right away would have been weird and lacking conflict) she seemed to trust him, and he was always picking her up and carrying her places like a good damsel in distress.

Adam Skinner's situation didn't ring true: for attempted murder he's released into custody and then somehow becomes the pawn of the evil guy who wants Ebony – this evil guy, who could not have known about the animosity between Jordan and Skinner.

The plot didn't exactly wrap up some loose ends, leaving it open for the sequel. And certain worldbuilding rules such as 'There is NO WAY the bad guys can break into this fortified, protected, magical space' quickly turned to 'Oh noes, the bad guys have breached our defences!'

While the writing was generally a bit clumsy, leaving me to wonder at motivations and introspections, the plot kind of seemed like it was written by a teenager – the beautiful, naïve, innocent but secretly powerful girl being chased by her true love, her new male BFF, and the evil guy who just wants to bone her. Kind of reminds me of House of Night, with Zoey Redbird and all of her 'legitimate' boyfriends.

Also, I have an issue with the blurb. It says:

“She's growing more beautiful by the day, she's freakishly strong, and then there's the fact that she's glowing.”

Now, in the book, nothing indicates that she is becoming more beautiful every day – there is a reference to her being taller and curvier than Amber, and that she's suddenly grown boobs, but nothing about her daily increasing beauty. We see one instance of her being strong, which is when she knocks Jordan into a wall but we hear much more about how she's an uncannily fast runner and skips gym class. And not once do I recall an instance of her glowing apart from when she healed Jordan. So I kind of feel like the blurb was a little misleading.

## OVERALL

While I was reading it I just kept reminding myself that it's written for teenagers and trying to imagine that I was the kind of teen who liked to pretend I was the main character in the book I was reading. Maybe that way I would be charmed by the hot angel and his also-hot nemesis, fighting over me \*swoon much?\*

### DNF REVIEW:

I received this for review from the publisher via Netgalley

I must first of all say that I did not finish this book, through choice of my own, so my review will not be a reflection of the entire novel, only the part that I did read.

I had high expectations for Hidden, mainly because I know a few people who had really enjoyed it but, sadly, this wasn't the case for me. Maybe it's because I had such expectations that I didn't like it, but I guess we'll never know.

From the start, it is evident that Ebony is different. Even she knows it, but she doesn't know why. Why can she run faster than everybody else? Why does she have violet eyes? Why does she have the ability to heal? These were questions that were answered fairly early on in the book so the reader isn't left guessing, something that I really liked about the novel.

Narrated by Ebony and Jordan, both of our protagonists, we got to see this book from a multiple perspective. I liked that because it meant that we got to see a larger part of the story rather than a tiny part if there were only one narrator.

I haven't read a lot of books featuring insta-love but this is one of the few that I will be adding to my insta-love shelf. I've now found that insta-love bugs me and I won't be reading another book with insta-love featured in it for a long time.

I loved the concept of this novel and, although I've read quite a few books with a similar plotline, this one

had many unique aspects.

I found the characterisation very poor and wanted to scream at Ebony and Jordan on numerous occasions. Jordan irritated me more and more as the book progressed. This was one of the reasons why I put the book down. Whenever I pick up a book I want to be able to relate to the characters and feel something towards them, whether it be sympathy or hate for an antagonist. I didn't, however, feel any of those things for either Ebony or Jordan.

I don't think I'll be reading anything else written by this author because I think I'm slightly too old to be reading this thing. It felt forced to me and I wasn't comfortable with reading it. I do understand, however, why it may appeal to other people.

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### **Amy (Turn the Page) says**

I've been waiting eight years for Marianne Curley to write another book. So I'm kind of gutted that when it

finally arrived, I meandered through to 40% before deciding to put it aside.

Marianne Curley was one of my favourite authors growing up. I love Old Magic and her Guardians of Time trilogy and have read them all several times, though not for many years now. I have to wonder if I'd still love them as much if I picked them up for the first time today. Would I have the same trouble with them as I did with Hidden?

Perhaps Old Magic also followed a trend at the time it was written — but at the time, it wasn't like any other book I had read. It was a perfect combination of my favourite things: magic, romance, the good guys fighting the bad guys and a strong historical feel.

Well, not much has changed — I'll still pick up any book that promises those things — but I'm also far more aware of what's out there now. I know what's popular and what's been done to death and I know what I'm personally bored of, or turned off by, in YA. I'm (slightly) better read. And Hidden, sadly, is just too generic for me to muster any interest in it. It feels lazy to me. I got practically half way through and nothing stood out. It feels like the same story that's been circulating the paranormal YA bookshelf for a couple of years now and I couldn't help but compare it to more powerful writers I've come across since I last picked up a Curley novel.

Perhaps it was unfair of me to even request to review Hidden. I had strong misgivings just after reading the synopsis. Frankly it sounded like a book I'd hate. But I so wanted to be surprised.

Instead I was bored. Hidden fails to invoke any sort of tension or intrigue. The character's were uninspiring, cliché and just plain forgettable. Ebony's only attributes are that she is clumsy and awkward and has unusual, striking eyes and an unnatural strength. Jordan falls for her at first sight. He has a mysterious, tragic backstory, one he's intent on punishing himself for most of the book. With his typical bad boy image, Jordan is misjudged by the entire town, while Ebony is universally (we're told) loved by it.

The dialogue is awkward and jarring. Ebony is (apparently) extremely intelligent, but comes across instead as condescending, not to mention completely unrealistic. It's very difficult to take a sixteen-year-old protagonist seriously when she says things like:

'Today, my beautiful friend -' I lean forward to pat Shadow's elegant neck and whisper in his ear — 'you will have a chance to stretch your long Arabian legs and we will fly together as if you have wings.'

Or one who talks to her parents like this:

'Someone blackmailed you into silence! What happened to your brains? This man didn't want you to expose his crime so he could go on selling more stolen babies.'...

'What about the non-belief system by which you raised me?' ...

'I promise you both it won't change our relationship, but you know me. You raised me to accept nothing less than facts substantiated by a second source.'

Jordan's dialogue, on the other hand, mostly consisted of:

'It's brilliant, man'...

‘Just be straight with me dude, and we’ll get on fine.’...

‘Get out of here!’...

And,

‘No shit’.

There’s also some seriously clunky info-dumping, whereby two angels explain the entire back-story, and everything we need to know about their kind, to Jordan in one overly long conversation.

Hidden just isn’t for me. I expect it will go down well enough with the thirteen to sixteen year-old demographic this book is aimed at, and at the end of the day, there’s nothing wrong with that. I went through my stage of inhaling those kinds of books then too. I’ve just outgrown them.

I don’t think Hidden will reach the same popularity as other books in the genre have over the last few years. It’s too late, too tired, for that. But I wouldn’t be surprised if Hidden has it’s share of readers who enjoy it, just as I enjoyed Old Magic ten years ago.

Regardless, of how I feel about this one, Curley’s earlier books will continue to have a special place on my bookshelf. Hidden however, won’t be joining them.

I want to start by saying that I am a fan of Marianne's books. Or perhaps more of the concepts that she presents in them. The way she does it isn't always the best.

This book is better than I remember it to be, though. The first half is actually really good and sometimes even funny - it did manage to get a few laughs out of me. The plot itself is good, too, mirroring Lucifer's fall and giving us what might come after it. *Hidden* does have one big problem though - its characters. We have two POV characters and that is Marianne's standard formatting which I usually enjoy. One of them is really well written, funny, believable and relatable - the other one is the main character. Don't get me wrong, Ebony isn't a bad character from the start, at worst she's a bit bland and is established as this "I'm not that special *but* there's something about me" character - but almost every YA heroine is built this way so I guess it's ok. She's trying to find herself and her body is changing in significant ways which is actually a great theme for young people. But all that is thrown out of the window as soon as she has a chance to get some answers. Nathanael is an enjoyable character too - in the first half of the book. His relationship with Jordan is probably the most significant relationship in the book altogether and it's nice seeing them grow fond of each other. But it all comes down to the moment when Ebony and Nathanael meet. I know they're meant to be, Marianne worked with this concept of soulmates before, but this time it just doesn't do it for me. It doesn't work. There is zero chemistry between them, Ebony doesn't trust him, she closes off and as I mentioned she doesn't want the answers, not really anyway - and the fact that his eyes are really pretty can't save that. But when they spend five minutes all alone, she loves him. And it's cringy. And while I always enjoyed Jordan's POV more, at this point I wished I didn't have to go through Ebony's chapters. Fortunately the antagonist is around the corner and we get some action and Ebony is presented with a tough choice. That isn't that tough really, I would go with Luca without hesitating. But I mean... the sound of your loved one's voice (whom you

love for like an hour by now) is worth sacrificing the chance to see your parents and having peace on Earth for one thousand years.

The last chapter is intriguing enough to leave us waiting for the next book though and *Hidden* itself leaves many questions to be answered too, which is great. But it's very easy to outgrow this book. It's a YA novel that takes a bit of that adult part out of it (although it gives us mentions of sex and some swearing and neither of these things were so distinct in Marianne's others books) which is not a bad thing. I'm sure it resonates with its target audience much better than with me, much better with the young than the adult - and I don't think I will come back to this book again.

While I've been feeling quite fed up with angel books lately, when I was offered this one for review, my interest was piqued. It's a different take on angel lore. There's no God or Devil, or Heaven or hell. But a King of Angels and a Dark Prince who reside in different realms. The concept of how the Dark Prince came to be is pretty similar, with the Dark Prince creating an army and waging war against The Angel King. There's a realm where the angels reside, a realm where mortal souls go after they die and The Dark Prince's realm. But the treaty that ended the war, allows the Dark Prince to wander the earth and collect souls.

Ebony knows she's different. She's faster, stronger and has better senses than any of her friends. She's never sick and when she gets hurt, she heals really quickly. She's had an extremely sheltered upbringing, even having never left the valley where she was born. One night, after she's sneaked out to a club, events occur which cause her to confront her parents once and for all when she gets home to find them waiting for her.

I found this book to be well written with really enjoyable characters. It's written from the POV of Ebony and Jordan, and I instantly liked them both. They are both really different people, with very different upbringings but they are brought together by events that are unbelievable to both of them.

Thane and the angels were great secondary characters. While we spend very little time with some of them, I still found it easy to like and build interest in them. There isn't much romantic interlude here, but what little there is, I did enjoy. And there's an action packed battle that had my heart pounding in my chest.

In my opinion, *Hidden* was a fast paced page turner that I didn't want to put down.

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
