Inu Yasha 01 isn't bad by any means, it's just one of those firsts in a book/manga series that didn't make me feel interested in how the story will continue. Once the manga started, everything happened at once and I was like, wait, can we please slow down a little here? It gave no depth to anything that was happening because there was just too much happening to focus on one thing at a time. This girl literally accidentally time travels and she thinks once or twice about how much she wants to go home and that's it. I know it's a manga and that I shouldn't be expecting too much emotional depth but I WOULD BE FREAKING OUT. Especially considering what shit goes down in the world of Inu Yasha.

That's pretty much my only complaint, the missing depth that's too-much-is-happening-at-once's fault. I have the next 5 volumes here, so I'll definitely continue this series and hope that it gets better for me. If that doesn't happen with the next 5 volumes, I won't read any further because ain't nobody got time for a 60 volumes long manga series that you don't enjoy.

This took approximately forever to get through. There are so many freaking volumes. At first, I enjoyed it, because it was kind of funny and silly. Unfortunately, it's incredibly formulaic and repetitive, kind of like episodes of The Power Rangers. You know what's going to happen, but it takes all of time to get there.

Basically, for about fifty of the volumes, they keep having skirmishes with the big bad of the series, Naraku. He's a hanyou like Inuyasha, determined to use the Shikon no Tama to become a full youkai and to be the most powerful dude in the world. He creates an evil league of evil to help him in his quest, and is generally a pain. Worst of all, whenever the good guys are winning a battle, he dematerializes, so that he can fight another day. Can anyone explain to me why only the bad guys have this power?

Speaking of power, Inuyasha and his brother have a lot of it, more than anyone else apparently. Apparently being hanyou is to power as being a muggle-born witch has to do with magical ability, which is to say that it has very little to do with it. However, what drove me completely crazy was that Inuyasha has like three attacks for thirty-some volumes of the series. He doesn't learn anything! He continues to fight like an idiot, and finally gets attacks because other people help him out. Inuyasha does not really seem like a hero who would be able to defeat anyone intelligent enough to target his weaknesses.

Okay, so as a shounen, it's not that great, because the action is so mindless and repetitive. How about the romance elements? Those are better at least, right? Not in my opinion. For longer than I deem acceptable, Inuyasha continues to be torn between Kagome and Kikyou. I get that it's a complicated situation, but that is so not cool. Plus, Kagome's like 14 or something at the beginning. Sheesh.

The other romance of the series is Houshi and Sango, which I definitely did not ship either. Houshi really creeps me out because of the way he asks every woman he meets if she'll bear his child. Sango would probably be my favorite character, because she kicks so much ass, but she always becomes so girly and not like herself around Houshi. Ugh!

The art is not great, though it does have a certain charm. However, this charm dissipates over time. In a lot of

long manga series, the art gets better along the way, but not so here.

This definitely turned out not to be my thing. The story is weak (seriously, how did Kagome pass middle school?) and so is the characterization. However, this is one of the most popular manga there is, so keep in mind that lots of people probably would not agree with my reactions.

I love this series! Rumiko Takahashi returns with a story that has all the comedy of her popular series "Ranma 1/2", but with more attention to plot and character development.

Kagome is a young Japanese highschooler in modern Japan. When she falls in an ancient well on her home property, she finds herself transferred to ancient Japan! There, she discovers she is a reincarnation of a priestess whose job was to protect a magical item called the Shikon Jewel. Ancient Japan is littered with a cast of characters, from talking animals to demons and half-demons. This jewel if in posession of a demon or a half-demon, can make that demon extra powerful and lethal. When Kagome causes the Shikon jewel to shatter, she is forced to pair up with Inuyasha, an unruly half-demon, in order to repair the damage she has done!

This series is progressive in a way that Takahashi's "Ranma 1/2" fails to be. Whereas Ranma 1/2 was filled with comedic scenes and the characters' relationships suffered as a result, here Takahashi balances everything out - the plot moves, and at such a thrilling pace! The characters develop, learn, and fall in love, and the comedy is enough to split your sides without subtracting from the overall story's movement.

I would recommend this series to any graphic-novel fan.

Before I go into any detail about this manga let me first go onto a short rant. So I was originally going to do a review on a whole manga series and the same review would be on every volume. But certain manga series (like this one) are over 20 volumes. So I decided to it the series piece by piece and for this review I'm going to go over the first volume and then volumes 2 & 3 will be roughly the same.

So let's get started.

Before I talk about the plot I'm going to talk about my past concerning manga. Aside from *Dragon Knights* this was the first manga I was introduced to before I became a member of the anime/manga fan community. Since this was the first manga I read, I definitely have a soft spot for it and I absolutely love it despite its flaws. Yes, this manga is not perfect and there are some parts that are completely stupid but I'm to say that those flaws can be found in other manga as well and not just this one.

Now let's take a look at the story.

So the story is about an ordinary *junior high school* student who just turned 15 and gets dragged into this medieval world where she is the reincarnation of a priestess who was once the guardian of the powerful

jewel called the Shikon Jewel. Her traveling into this fantasy world awakens a sealed half-demon named Inuyasha who was sealed to a tree by a sacred arrow by the deceased priestess Kikyou. A centipede demon chases Kagome and pulls out a powerful jewel out of her body which turns out to be the Shikon jewel. Men and demons come after it and Kagome ends up accidentally shattering the jewel into pieces and scattering them across the land. So now Inuyasha and Kagome have to work together to find pieces of the sacred jewel before anyone else gathers the pieces and becomes stronger with the jewels power.

Already in the first volume, this manga sucks you in and here you go for an adventure. The art in the manga is a cutesy art form and the adventure that comes off that pages is really a lot of fun without having to be too complex. So far, the characters are really enjoyable.

Kagome is your average fifteen year old girl who's really fun to follow. I really like how she's not really annoying given her circumstance. She's in an unfamiliar place and because of that she can't help but be in danger. It also doesn't help that she has the Shikon jewel in her body which attracts demons. She's nice but also tends to blow in people's faces if she's pushed to her limits.

Inuyasha is an awesome anti-hero. He doesn't want to help Kagome gather the jewel shards because it's the right thing to do. He wants to use the jewel to become a full-fledged demon and get stronger. He's a typical tough guy who has a soft spot in there somewhere. These two characters are fun to read about and the tension and fights between them is just hilarious.

The villain (as of now) is really creative and also fun. Sure, you had human bandits and other demons that tried to get the jewel but those were taken down quickly and their purpose was to take the jewel out of Kagome's body and to have her break it so the journey can begin. Yura of the hair has an interesting use of hair and actually makes a very dangerous weapon, given that the hair is also invisible as well except for individuals with spiritual powers it makes the hair even that much deadlier.

So for a first volume, it's actually pretty great and brings you in for a big adventure. And by big I mean **long**.

Another manga book I've read probably a hundred times, haha. Least in English, this is my first in Japanese. Coming off of Detective Conan, I was thinking of trying something a bit different. For Japanese learners, I'll discuss that below.

As for the book content itself:

What can I say? I'm nostalgic. Rereading this again, after so many years, I can hear their voices perfectly, the music thumping in the background, all the sound effects, it was an awesome time to go through this again! I might be a bit biased, since this series, both as a manga and anime, made up a large part of my childhood. It's a fun adventure series with colorful characters and memorable moments. Lots of fantasy, suspense, mystery, drama, romance, humor, horror, and pretty much every other genre you can think of all rolled up into one.

It isn't all perfect though, of course. I have my nit-picks, but given my nostalgia for it, I'm more able to let those things slide. I'm glad the series was able to come to a conclusion, and we got the answers we wanted, and some we didn't even know we wanted. Be warned though, there is a LARGE amount of filler!

For the Japanese bit:

I was hoping to go into this with an easier time than Detective Conan, since there are much less words per page. Conan is great for beginners sure, but it still took me some time to get through, and I thought I'd feel more successful progress going through a book with significantly less text. To my surprise, it didn't go as planned!

The grammar is for sure at least N4, with a few N3/N2 thrown in, but it wasn't just the basics that was throwing me off, it was the archaic vocabulary and super informal speech! So while Conan took me longer, I understood more. Inuyasha went faster, but I understood less. Several old terms, which to be fair, I should've seen coming, and the crudeness with which people speak, also should've seen coming, slowed me down quite a bit. Luckily I found fan translations online (much more true to the original Japanese than officially published translations) and was able to check my work. And for those who don't know, this book DOES include furigana for all kanji, which does help a lot if you're unfamiliar with them!

If you're looking to study and trying to find a good first book, DO NOT PICK THIS ONE. Most places that teach you Japanese will NOT prepare you for this. I would recommend Yotsuba (from what I've heard from others) or Detective Conan (from personal experience). If you have a stronger ability of the language, you'll be able to pick up on how to read the informalities, dialects, and colloquialisms of this book, but until then, I'd hold off. Having to look up too many things in a row could hinder motivation. But hey, if you're really that determined, don't let me stop you. Just be ready for having to do some research!

I wasn't incredibly impressed by the first couple of volumes when I read them early last year. The story felt less fluid and the art is in that older style of drawing that I'm not incredibly fond of. It's a difficult adjustment to make, seeing something you love in a different medium and I stopped reading before I was able to adjust to it.

Something that's also giving me some difficulty is the story itself. Because the anime was so incredibly faithful to the manga's material (at least as far as I've read), this isn't anything new to me. Even the dialogue matches up word for word in some places. For someone is still cooing over the anime it's hard to really get into the series because that element of surprise, being introduced to something new, not knowing a characters history, motivation, and future, just isn't there any more.

So I've marked this series as dropped, but just for now! At some point I am going to read this series then entire way through, all 56 volumes of it, because it is so close to my heart. But it has to be at a point where returning to this doesn't activate my sense of *deja vu*.

If you love something, sometimes you've got to let it go and hope it comes back to you.

Okay, so once again, this review comes after rereading the first volume.

I've always had a warm spot in my heart for InuYasha. It was the first anime I ever watched, which I stumbled upon by flicking through television channels at ten o'clock on a Saturday night. It was the first manga I ever purchased and read. It's the reason why I draw in an anime style.

I love Rumiko Takahashi's drawing style. I love it. Love love love it. The artwork within the pages is wonderful, ESPECIALLY the coloured pages. Oh my god, the coloured pages. Not to mentioned the coloured prints at the end of the volume. Kikyo looks so much more badass in the manga. And Mistress Centipede looks way more gruesome after swallowing the Shikon no Tama.

Takahashi has a good way of telling a story in this first volume, as well. Not just the artwork, but the actual writing. This volume begins in the Sengoku Jidai, or the Warring States, era of Japan, where Takahashi sets up one of the main plotlines of the series. The old history nerd in me can't get enough of it.

Now, I've read the first few volumes of InuYasha several times. I've read it translated straight from the Japanese, as well as altered English copies. Personally, I prefer the manga as translated straight from Japanese better. I like that it still keeps a lot of the Japanese terms, and I feel like the story telling just flows better.

Moving on, I'm pretty sure Yura of the Hair is my favourite female villain in this series. I don't even know why. She's girlish and fierce and all kinds of wildly sexy. I don't really understand why she says "la" all the time, but I'm willing to overlook it. I really wish we could see more of her in this series than what we do.
