This installment finds everyone's favorite wine taster, Benjamin facing a family crisis. It's a cozy mystery, so one can pretty much figure out how that ends before even opening the book.

However, the charm of this series rests not on the mystery but on the Cooker family and the scenery where the series takes place. This series is something that you enjoy not because it is on the level of Ruth Rendell, but because it is a pleasant hour that concerns wine and food, with a little mystery thrown in for good measure.

As a plus to this, the Cooker family is believable family in the sense that the family is clearly a close one without being too over repetitive in saying it is one. In other words, the Cooker family is a happy family in a way that does not defy belief. It is fun spending time with them, and they are the type of family that you might want to stay with will visiting France.

Virgile too is here as well, and while the trajectory of his story is some too cliché in this story, it really does not take away from the pleasant enjoyment that this series brings.

Benjamin and his wife Elisabeth have planned a holiday in Margaux, France where he hopes to inspect the vines that have suffered with the severe heat threatening many of the vineyards in the area. When his daughter, Margaux is in a serious accident the night before they are to leave he is suspicious that perhaps the accident was not an accident after all. Once she is able Benjamin spirits her out of the hospital recuperate with the on holiday. When Virgile arrives and meets Margaux they seem to hit it off. Which seems to rub Benjamin the wrong way, after all no one is good enough for his little girl. The more he and Virgile look into the accident and those who might have a reason to cause the accident the more secrets they bring to light and old scores to be settled. Who could want to harm Margaux? Will Benjamin step in between the growing friendship between his daughter and his assistant?

At 164 pages this is still a short story, but you will not be able to tell once you start reading. The writers have managed to pack Mayhem in Margaux full of suspense and unusual clues, not to mention watching Benjamin's consternation as he sees his assistants interest in his baby girl. Every father's dilemma a good man finds our daughter attractive, but is he good enough? Every parent's worst nightmare is also involved finding out your precious daughter has been injured in a serious accident. With many directions to go you will be led on a merry chase in book six of the Winemaker Detective Series. Easily read in one sitting, this fast paced mystery is another winner for Jean-Pierre Alaux and Noel Balen. My rating is 4 1/2 stars out of 5.

The winemakers feel a personal stress when the daughter of Benjamin Cooker is injured in a car accident. Possibly the car was tampered with - was young Margaux, a business student, the intended victim, or the young man who was driving? Cooker and his assistant Virgile drop everything to protect the family.

We see this against the backdrop of a hot dry summer, with wine harvests suffering and other issues such as metal screw caps instead of corks being debated. Modern methods are not always welcome in traditional wine regions and corporate purchasing of vineyards tends to sweep away established workers as well as traditional crafts. This is a well-written and different instalment, with less wine tasting than usual and only salads being eaten in the heat. Enjoy.

Finally we get to see a glimpse of Benjamin Cooker's family, although the portrayal of his wife Elizabeth has the substance of a feather. His daughter Margaux, on the other hand, has a starring role as the survivor of a lethal auto accident. Bordeaux is undergoing a heat wave and drought, which keeps Cooker and his assistant Virgile busy consulting on distressed vines and speculating on the effects of global warming on the French wine industry.

I look forward to each of these books. I learn something new about wines every time and I am entertained by characters with whom I like to spend time. In this outing, we meet Margaux, Benjamin Cooker's daughter. She is another great character to add to the mix but her life is almost extinguished because she gets in the car of the wrong person.

When the car crashes and it is determined that it was not accidental, Benjamin is drawn into discovering who sabotaged the vehicle and why. It is intensely personal this time so both he and his assistant, Virgile, go to great lengths to unravel the mystery.

I suspect we may see more of Margaux and Virgile and that would be fine with me. I rather liked the tentative way they started their relationship. As always, once the crime is solved, there are no huge surprises, just something that makes a lot of sense.

If you have not yet discovered this series, I recommend it especially if you are a fan of wine. You could probably sample any one of the books first and still find your way in the story line. But if you are looking for some good summer reading, perhaps with a glass of wine by your side, this might tickle your taste buds.

Essa pergunta voltou a me perseguir na leitura de Desvendando Margaux, dos autores Jean-Pierre Alaux e Noël Balen. Estava a procura de uma leiturinha fácil, de um livrinho de mistério, detetive, qualquer coisa, para passar uma tarde de folga e esquecer o cotidiano quente do verão carioca. Peguei esse livro que é o segundo de uma série policial da dupla, passado nos vinhedos franceses. Um dos autores é especialista em vinhos e seu parceiro é jornalista.

É um dos livros policiais mais insossos que já li. Não há tensão. Não há um mistério que agarre a atenção. Os personagens são comuns, o drama sofrível, o mistério quase inexistente. Há sim algumas noções de gerenciamento de vinhedos e o panorama por trás da produção de vinhos. Mas falta aquela trama que não deixa dormir. Essa obra não dá ao leitor o frenesi de ter que chegar ao final, nem é cheia do charme de uma Miss Marple que resolve as intrigas da cadeira de balanço de sua casa na aldeia.

Though some turbulent years produce great wines, most vintners are worried about losing their vines. During his visits to the different vineyards, his visiting daughter (whose name in Margaux) gets involved with the manager of a chateau recently bought by a Swiss bank.

When his daughter and the manager crash his Porche, the police find that the brake lines had been cut. When the manager dies it becomes a case of murder for the Benjamin Cooper (the Winemaker detective) and his assistant Virgile.

Besides making the Bordeaux area safe for good wines, saving the current crop and having a great time

buying Virgile a vintage car, they also manage to find the murderer. A fun time was had by all, except that Ben is now worried that Virgile and his daughter have become too close.
