It's fine. I never felt particularly involved, and I certainly never felt frightened. The characters chat as they wander around and kill people which could have worked if it was longer and made you feel like people were

dying. Mostly I felt indifferent to the carnage they were inflicting. The twist happened at such a rate as well that by the time it was being confirmed I hadn't entirely noticed that it hadn't been revealed yet.

I didn't realize going in that this was about serial killers. I'm really not interested in reading stories about them, and am kind of tired of the obsession with the "genius serial killer" and with "understanding" them.

It kind of reminded me of the Cereal Convention in *The Sandman: The Doll's House* although this was lacking the satirical edge that that story had.

Fair warning: There's a lot of violence in here. Nothing hugely grotesque, but a lot of killing and blood. So if that's not your jam, you might want to steer clear.
