This is an amazing novel. I love reading drama, as well as tragedy and comedy. Tim Stutler skillfully meshes these forms together. Hillari's Head not only moved me but - and I'm a little embarrassed to admit this - is so funny in places that I actually snorted! The humor ranges from subtle irony to wicked wit to sly satire to absurdity. This author has a nice comedic touch. But Hillari's Head is not a comedy or farce. It is fundamentally a touching drama. Also the humor is not randomly thrown into the story, but actually advances the plot. And it is some plot! The book has elements of women's fiction, a legal thriller, and even a romance novel. Plus it is so well written that I was absorbed from the peculiar beginning to the startling ending. The chapter endings appeared designed to compel the reader to finish "just one more chapter" before bed. As someone else commented, I just couldn't put it down.

I sat and reflected on the story after finishing it, not just to savor it, but to look for major flaws. Sorry author that's just something I do. I don't want to give away any spoilers and will just say that I was disappointed by a major turn of events in the story. I understand why it had to happen but that didn't make it any easier. I also think Hillari's Head could easily have been fifty to a hundred pages longer, mostly because I hated seeing it

end, but I really loved this book overall.

Have you ever stared at someone...that didn't look normal? Shame on you! After you finish reading this book you will think twice about doing this, or have a greater appreciation for what this person deals with.

Hillari's head was huge and she didn't have any teeth. She suffered from Oligodontia, a rare developmental dental anomaly in humans characterized by the absence of six or more teeth.

Kristina Orris, lived with her father and her sister, Hillari. Kristina didn't think there was anything wrong with her sister. From the time Hill was five, the other kids bullied her at school. Her father's only option was homeschool. When Hill went out she wore a dust mask and in winter Hill's favourite time of the year, she wrapped a scarf around her face...she could blend in and seem normal. Her mother had died when she was a baby, and her father died before Hillari's 18th birthday. He was the only man that accepted her for who she was.

At eighteen Kristina abandoned her home, her past and Hillari and moved from Pennsylvania to San Diego to pursue a lifetime dream of becoming a lawyer. She had just finished paralegal school and was looking for a position with a local firm. When she moved into her condo, while looking for a job, she started a blog, about Hill, and wrote about her life. Through her neighbour, Jennifer Monday, a retired US Magistrate, alias "Judgement Day", she joined in their cycling group, and met Gideon Ducker, a trial lawyer, who offered her a job in employment litigation, as a paralegal secretary.

For Kristina, being in the office was draining and she felt inadequate. The cases were so intense. But Duck was funny, kind and very smart. He had charisma and his own unique style conducting himself in court...it was drama. But there was chemistry going on between the two of them.

The author sent me an arc in exchange for an honest review. And being honest i'm really not sure what I expected after reading the synopsis for this book, it's not like anything I've read before and when I read the words paralegals and attorneys it brought to mind shows like Suits and Law and Order and I was a little apprehensive, because court room drama isn't really my thing. But to my delight Hillari's Head was nothing like those shows, I really enjoyed reading it and i'm definitely going to read outside my genre comfort zone more often. Hillari's Head is about Kristina a paralegal starting her new life, she's certain she is over her traumatic past, the death of her father and leaving behind her sister Hillari who suffers from Oligodontia - where six or more teeth fail to develop - and an over sized head. But when the memory of Hillari starts to haunt Kristina she has to learn that "You can't escape the past, until you accept what has passed." - I absolutely adore that quote.

The writing was superb, the author did a great job with Kristina's character she felt very real and I really liked her. I'm always surprised when a male author creates such a realistic female character that I really connect with, Stutler must of done some research on female protagonist because Kristina was expertly developed. Tim Stutler brings a renaissance perspective to the pages of Hillari's Head, treating the reader to a panoply of scenes ranging from bicycling, tea parties and e-dating to formal balls – and much more. After introducing the main characters, the story advances as a legal drama, offering the reader a glimpse into the world of high-stakes employment litigation through the eyes of a beautiful but vulnerable woman. From that vantage, the reader witnesses the talents of a litigator at the peak of his power. And he encounters sinister plotters whose nefarious machinations provide grist for a rich plot.

Although the story turns at times onto the blazed path of a legal thriller, it is much more; in many ways, it is a psychodrama of self-discovery. It is also a story of romance and courage. Stutler employs the legal drama as a crucible, testing and changing his characters – particularly the beautiful young protagonist.

Tim Stutler clearly loves to write. At times his book rips the reader with infectious humor. At other moments, it challenges the reader with intricate legal sequences. Through it all, the twisting plot of Hillari's Head compels the reader to keep turning the pages. At the end, he is surprised – surprised at the welling of his own deepest emotions.
