The book is about a young man, Alasdair, who is from Scotland and visiting his cousin who has moved to the States. Trevor takes Alasdair to the local Ft. Wayne (IN) Highland Games for an afternoon of fun and then ditches him. Trouble is, Alasdair is blind and is in a strange location. He and his guide dog make it out of the crowd, but he is lost as to how to get back to Trevor's home from there.

And into his life walks, Trisha who sees his dilemma and comes to help. Trisha doesn't pity him or treat him as helpless, but she does spend the day with him and acts as a perfect guide because of her fun loving nature and ability to describe in such a way that he 'sees' what she is describing. They really hit it off and agree to see each other again.

The only fly in the ointment is that Trisha is keeping a secret. She is not the beauty that Alasdair keeps complimenting her to be. She loves that he thinks she is beautiful and hates not telling him the truth of what others see when they look at her. Her biggest fear is that once he knows the truth that he will only see her imperfection and not her.

The author uses Trisha's secret to build a little suspense by not allowing the readers to find out exactly what Trisha's 'ugliness' is until Alasdair finds out. I also enjoyed the theme of this romance- Two people that are constantly judged by others because of a physical flaw do not judge each other that way and find happiness as a result.

I highly recommend this short story to anyone who loves a sweet clean romance particularly if you are partial to highlanders in kilts. ;D

What can a blind man do when his unreliable cousin abandons him in the middle of a Highland Games festival? Should he follow a woman who has a beautiful voice?

Alasdair Buchanan was blinded in an accident a few years ago and has acquired a helpful guide dog, Foster. However, attending a festival requires more than a guide dog to help him find where he needs to go, especially since it's only his third day in America. Trisha Wright happened to find him and Foster in front of a river and decided to help him out. She is actually glad that he can't see because she doesn't want him to view what has scared everyone else off. Trisha, a graphic designer, has the ability to describe with wonderful detail what is going on around them. However, she does so without being overly verbose, intrusive, or condescending, making Alastair enjoy himself immensely in her company.

I enjoyed this little story so much that I wanted to be the one who got to try the food at the festival! I loved the descriptions of surroundings much more than in most stories since I was trying to get what Alasdair was experiencing. One of the things that really intrigued me was finding out the reason Trisha was worried about Alasdair finding out about her face. Alasdair is visiting from Scotland, he's at the Highland Games in Indiana and he's blind and recently abandoned by his cousin at the games. He ends up meeting Trisha whose voice does something to him. The two hit it off really well and spend days hanging out, but Trisha is worried that if Alasdair knew what she really looked like he wouldn't want to associate with her. Alasdair thought that from her voice she was beautiful, Trisha spent all her time mentally referencing her ugly appearance and how folks treated her, shoot for a minute I thought she was an ugly tart that the town just didn't associate with, but once I found out what her "issue" was, I was really disappointed. I was like THAT was the big issue, something she had no control over or could do anything about, but she considered herself to be this horrible ugly duckling! I could have understood her being self conscious, any woman would have been, but she was way left field with her belief in her ugly appearance. Of course, to make matter worse, though Alasdair is blind, he has black hair, and piercing green eyes, and is built like a true Scotsman (in a kilt to boot), so blind or not, he was noticeable for his good looks and his great sense of humor.
