Following directly after the first book, The Lonely Lake Monster find Ben and Pearl as assistants to Dr. Woo, the vet for extraordinary creatures. This book is from Pearl's point of view, which was a nice change from the first book, which was from Ben's point of view. Selfors does a great job of summing up the series so far in an easy to understand and pick up this book out of order. In this book, Pearl manages to get in big trouble. Ben becomes captured by the lake monster and Pearl must figure out how to get him away from the monster without jeopardizing their assistant positions.

The best plan Pearl comes up with involves a sick leprechaun, who may or may not be willing to help her. I found this plot to be a step up from the previous novel in ways. I like the way the pair dodges the curious Mrs. Mulberry and her daughter, who keep nosing around the hospital.

I like the way we see Pearl grow a little in this book, as she finds that her first approach is not always the best. Ben is the more cautious of the two, but is curious enough to follow Pearl into some interesting situations. I do love that it is Ben that gets captured and needs saving.

Final Verdict: A solid second book, The Lonely Lake Monster finds a new adventure with more fantastical creatures and problems to be solved.

I like how Selfors switched the narrative focus from Ben to Pearl in the second book. A lot of character development takes place and Pearl becomes a much more three dimensional character after The Sasquatch Escape. A lot more depth is given to her inner monologue and how she feels about being labeled 'Troublemaker'. It seems the main issue with Pearl is that she has a bit of a problem with impulse control and that her plans are not always the most well thought out. This of course, spurs the plot forward when she convinces Ben to wander outside Dr. Woo's office toward the lake where the monster lives. I think my favorite portion of the book is when Pearl takes a moment to reflect on her new apprenticeship and her blooming friendship with Ben. It shows that despite her bravado and bravery in the face of adventure, she is actually quite vulnerable and has been hurt before. This book also touches on Pearl's feelings about her family. Sure, she loves them and seems happy, but seems very eager to put on a pair of magical shoes offered to her because they do things that Dollar Store shoes don't.

His is a great followup to The Sasquatch Escape which has turned into a runaway hit at the library where I work. Kids who enjoyed the first book will easily slip back into the world of Buttonville, eager and ready to assist Dr. Woo as she cares for her imaginary creatures.

The second title in The Imaginary Veterinary series follow Pearl Petal and Ben Silverstein on their inaugural day as apprentices to the mysterious Dr. Woo. Although they have been given conditions to follow in order to keep them safe from harm as they work, Pearl can't manage to contain her curiosity. They end up meeting up with a watery creature who lives in the nearby lake and suffers from acute loneliness. Pearl is the one who figures a solution to the lake monster's problems, and readers will see a hint of what she does from her treatment of her own bird earlier in the book. The book is funny, and the characters are interesting enough to keep readers turning the book's pages. Since the creatures that are helped in Dr. Woo's hospital are all imaginary, there is much room for adventures in the books to come in the series.
