I loved Srinivasan's first Little Owl picture book, *Little Owl's Night*, and *Little Owl's Day* is the perfect follow up. You get to see the daytime version of Little Owl's forest, full of all sorts of diurnal creatures and other sights that can only be enjoyed in the sunshine, like rainbows and sun-loving flowers. There are fun tie-ins to the first book as well—like Little Owl's finally getting to show Bear the moon. The art is superb—a really interesting style. I love that this book keeps the same general style and color themes while at the same

time pulling in a much brighter palette to emphasize the difference between the day and night. The writing style is great for a preschool audience (my 1-1/2-year-old niece loves these books), while having a nice flow that's enjoyable to read aloud—no annoying “see Spot run” sort of stuff. Definitely a recommended read for those with younger children.
