In this installment of the Minnie and Moo series, the silly, but well-meaning cows dress up as Cupid, complete with tutus, wings, a bow and arrows, to deliver "love poems for the needy." Moo is the writer, Minnie is the archer. The poems however, are not always as flattering as intended, while some do not hit the right target. The result is fun chaos. For instance, the Holsteins, Bea and Madge, are the recipients of a "love poem," that reads in part, "Dearest buffalo lips,/your ultra-wide hips/are as big as six ships." Moo is not exactly Lord Byron. Still, her poetry is fun to read aloud.

My favorite is her "Ode to the Cream Puff" at the beginning of the book. "Your peaks are crowned/with the sweetest snow;/Your valleys crisp/in deep-fried dough;/Your insides filled/ with that custard stuff;/How I love thee/my sweet Cream Puff." This makes you want to grab one of those pastries, no? I think young readers will want to reach for another crazy Minnie and Moo book too, because the language is lively and the illustrations are colorful, especially the bubblegum pink tutu and wings.

Even though there are chapters, I'm not sure I would read just one chapter per day. I think I would read the whole story in one day and then have students try to write their own "love poem." While I enjoyed the poems, I did not think that the pictures were very entertaining, which would make me question whether the story would keep students' attention, especially if I were to read the whole story in one day. Maybe it would be better to read the first half at the beginning of the day and the second half near the end of the school day. It would be a good story to introduce the writing activity.
