While they are there, Autumn finds a toy soldier that she gave to Swayer a few weeks earlier. There is a strong imprint on the toy and Autumn finds out that he is with this lawyer's house cleaner. As they got to the house to pick Swayer up from the house cleaner, they learned that the lawyer was putting the boy up for adoption in order to get rid of him.

The reason that everyone is after Dennis and his family is because, Dennis ran away from a dangerous family and its business. As it turns out his family runs an illegal business that he wanted no part in.

After finding Jake and Sawyer, Dennis and his family start a new life and Autumn and Jake realize how much they actually do love each other and that nothing is ever going to get between them.

I really liked the continuation of the "imprints" novel by Nunes. Autumn and her sister's ability to infer and draw things that have happened are such a unique twist of a gift that helps in solving mysteries.

Autumn continues to use her gift of getting imprints or past emotions left behind by people who last came into contact with that object. This time she has her sister to help her too. Her sister, Tauwani, is close to delivering her first baby, but wants Autumn's help in finding out where her friend and neighbor's husband, Dennis, has gone. When she first imprints, she sees Dennis leaving of his own accord, but when Tauwani shows the picture that she drew that shows Dennis in a perilous situation, Autumn reluctantly goes to Detective Shannon to ask for his help. Shannon and Autumn have a history from the last case Autumn was involved in that almost cost her her life...the cult. Shannon sees the need to intervene in the case.

What they find is Dennis' past has caught up to him, his real name isn't Dennis, but he is the only heir to a major eastern business and his cousin has come looking for him to bring him back. A lawyer at a firm, Ian, involves himself as a middle man. He tries to get money from Russo, Dennis' cousin, for giving him Dennis, and also Sioto, the rival business of Dennis' family for revenge against Dennis' involvement in Sioto's son's death and disappearance. The use of apartment buildings and the new building development causes, Kolanda, Jake's old girl friend to come to him for help. This puts Autumn in the jealousy mode and makes her start to doubt her place with Jake.

Autumn rescues Dennis, helps Shannon and his partner escape from Sioto. Jake is taken and held and then Sawyer, Dennis' young son is taken too. Can she find everyone safe before it is too late?

I liked it because the storyline was interesting, and I love the characters and their interaction with each other. I felt that the author had a solid grasp on who her characters were and keeping the storyline going in a very fluid way.

I felt that sometimes the priorities of the characters weren't natural. When the child went missing, sometimes the characters would talk about other things and didn't react the way normal people would in that type of situation.

Also, I felt as if the author didn't do any research into police policy and behavior. The officers and detectives in the story made bad decisions, allowed a citizen to go into dangerous situations and be involved in an investigation. I felt the author stretched police rules to allow her character to be involved in the mystery, but it was unrealistic. I also felt as if the author made the police useless in the story by having her character save them multiple times and solve all the mysteries. I felt the police were downplayed in the story, and made them seem to be useless in general.

This is a nice, clean mystery series that I would suggest to anyone who isn't a cop.

Overall Review: Autumn Rain never wears shoes, owns an Antiques store, only eats organic food and was raised by hippies. She can also sense deep feelings and situations from the memories that are imprinted on inanimate objects. She is most definitely one of the most unique heroines I've read in a long while! It's a shame that this is my first 'Autumn Rain' novel. This book being the third of a series, there were many allusions to other adventures and happenings. It still did quite well as a stand-alone book; I never felt confused at the plot or storyline, and I felt that there were enough descriptions of the characters that I 'knew' them. I did feel left out sometimes, but it wasn't terribly disturbing.

There is absolutely no profanity whatsoever.

This is a murder mystery/thriller genre, so there is quite a bit of violence, but it is very muted. There are a number of fights—most of them include a main character doing some roundhouse kicks and boxing stances and meditating on their next move. A character is attacked by a man with a knife (but she roundhouse-kicks him a few times and it's ok). There are a few shoot outs—some between the bad guys and the police, some between the bad guys and other random citizens. The bad guys dress up a cadaver to make it look like they murdered a little boy. There are many kidnappings (a little boy is taken right out of his backyard, and his mother is hit as she tries to take him back; a man is taken into a van and beaten; a man is taken and tortured for information, etc.). A character has imprints of people's memories, and she sees murders, fear, and abuse. There is all of this, but it is necessary to the plot and lacks the shock value and gore.

Some characters kiss a few times. There is a love triangle that involves a lot of confused feelings.

The mature themes are mostly mild and center around lying, deceit, murder, and organized crime.

Shades of Gray is recommended as a Clean Read for ages 16+!

I think my favorite thing about this series is how original it is. Autumn Rain and her twin sister, Tawnia, were separated and adopted by different families at birth. Autumn was raised by hippie parents and is definitely her own person--very organic, non-shoe wearing person.

What is so unique about these characters is that Autumn is able to read "imprints" that people leave on objects--if any emotion is placed on an object, she can "see" the scene and feel the feelings behind it. This gift helps her solve crimes and mysteries. Tawnia is an artist, who doesn't really accept her gift...yet. She sometimes randomly draws out a scene that is also handy in solving things.

This is okay reading. It's not as good as Imprints, the book before it. In fact, if I could give this half stars, it would be two and a half. To be brief:

Good

- * Quick read.
- * Mostly feel-good ending.
- * Ace. I have to admit I have a weak spot for bad boys and he totally gives off that vibe. I hope to see more of him in the future.
- * Some nice twists.
- * Dennis and his family. And Sawyer. He was cute.
- * The back and forth regarding the name for Tawnia's baby was adorable.
- * New Jersey mafia actually sound like people, not rejects from a Godfather movie.

Bad

- * Rules regarding imprints flip-flopped. One moment she can read them only once, but this seems to only apply to negative imprints. I think. Positive ones she can re-live over and over? Makes no sense except for warm fuzzies. Maybe this was in the first book but I was too involved in the story to care.
- * The romance with Jake. Though I liked the way she handled someone from his past, I thought the ending was almost a plot device meant to (view spoiler)
- * If you're looking for a gritty suspense (paranormal) novel, this isn't it. Though there's violence and Autumn does adapt in her outlook on life as a result, Nunes plots things in such a way that nothing truly bad ever really happens. There's always a way out.

However, if all you want is a superficial bit of suspense, a light read with a hint of tension and a fair amount of fun, this might be a good choice. I wasn't looking for anything heavy when I read this, so this aspect didn't turn me off at all.

- * Finally, Autumn. Her constant mention of organic food is becoming annoying. Also, in this novel she seems to have lost some of her intelligence: she can't seem to keep her mouth shut and, sadly, most of the time she doesn't get hurt because of it. I do admit I liked the one exception. And yes, I felt bad for thinking that way because she's not an evil character. She's just annoying.

* Oh, one more thing: the romance is okay in this. It's not as strong as it was in the first one (due to various questions that pop up), which is a shame because her greatest strength, from what I've seen so far, is in building a beautiful, sweet romance.

I'll read the next one, but I may not review it. Unless it has Ace. I really liked him and look forward to finding out more about him.
