"Merry Mistletoe" is my first book by Ms Emma Davies, and again I'm very happy to discover her for me. I didn't hesitate to hit the "request" button, the blurb sounded so inviting and I truly loved the cover. And even though this is a novella, not a full - length novel, I could immediately feel the warmth and feelings shining from the pages. Writing style is one of the biggest highlights of this story, I think, it's exceptionally lovely, tender and it just envelopes you with its warmth.

It is a lovely Christmas story that put friendship in the centre, written in a very lovely, eloquent way. The idea of Mistletoe Day was totally new to me, I've never come across this in books or internet, but sadly, after reading "Merry Mistletoe" I still am not sure what it is. This novella was also full of Christmas spirit and felt truly festive, with all this snow falling down, and well, in fact there was a great warmth to this story.

The book is written in a form of a countdown to Christmas, but also it was a kind of end to something and new beginning of something. The story doesn't introduce us to many characters, so it is really easy to quickly

understand who is who and that something happened to them in the past, that there is a secret or two that need to be revealed. The characters are easy to like or to dislike. I think that, even though I didn't get him so much, it was Amos that was the most colourful character - he was kind and took the things as he got them, and even though it is not deeply explored, or isn't explored at all and we are left to guess, there is the overwhelming feeling that Amos had history, that something happened to him.

I truly liked how much Freya was involved with her farm, Appleyard, and she would do anything to save it, but that she also knew when she must say "I can't anymore", which doesn't mean that she gives up! I really kept my fingers crossed for her and it was sad to see how she was struggling - there was this overwhelming feeling of sadness around Freya, I was guessing that her past was not the easiest one, and I really wanted that she succeed. You can't help but feel empathy and sympathy to Freya.

"Merry Mistletoe" is a sweet, charming story that, sadly, didn't wow me as much as I hoped, and as other bloggers, so probably "it's not you, it's me" case again. It just felt a little too unrealistic for my liking, and yes, I did like Freya, she was a lovely girl, but there are limits to a character being lovely. Everybody loved her, she could make no mistake, everybody was rooting for her, and there was not a single flaw to Freya. It was just too saint - like for my liking. And I still can't put my finger on Amos - where did he come from, and who he was in fact? Santa Claus? Guardian Angel? What was his role? (Update - if you are as confused as I was, please read Emma Davies' brilliant guest post about inspiration for writing Amos - she explains it really great!) Also, the past of Freya and the Henderson brothers was not explained in as many details as I would like. In fact, the story felt a little too flat and too abrupt, and this is perhaps why I couldn't warm to the characters or to the story itself.

But. This is a very gentle and very intelligent novella that combines a little romance, troubles and Christmas spirit. I liked the moments when Freya was in the village at the auction or just strolled through the streets decorated for Christmas - it all looked very peaceful, and very cosy, and I love such places, and Emma Davies has wonderfully brought it to life. She has created a warm and fast - paced novella with a sparkle of magic with some twists and turns about friendship, Christmas magic and finding happiness.

Merry Mistletoe is the first work of Emma Davies that I have read, and in respect of the story-line and its Christmassy-ness it ticked all of my required boxes, and in great style.

I think there is always something charming about taking a simple storyline, and giving a little Christmas magic. If the writing is up to snuff, it then morphs from simple into something very special. Freya and Sam have known each other since childhood, and as the book progresses, due to the more contact and time they spend with each other you come to learn that although living on neighbouring farms, their friendship was broken, and the reasons why.

Despite the torrents of life, things always endured.

Having suddenly lost her beloved father, Freya is tasked with getting in the seasons Holly and Mistletoe harvest with the help of drifter Amos, and hardly any help from her toad of a boyfriend. Things do not go quite according to plan and Freya ends up without said boyfriend, a broken arm, and due to lack of money is forced into looking to sell the farm.

This was a quick, entertaining and heart-warming read. It bought a tear to my eye when reading of Freya's yearly visit to the Christmas Decoration display to choose a new ornament in memory of her father, as this is something I do every year with my mother although I am lucky in that she is still with me to make the selection. If you are looking for a little Christmas sparkle and a well written '*Happily Ever After*' I urge you to give this little novella a go.

Merry Mistletoe was a sweet story, that really brings home the value of friendship and goodwill at Christmas.

Freya is dreading losing Appleyard Farm and the Sherbourne orchards, having had it in the family for over a hundred years, but when her dad did, he left a lot of debts, so Freya can't see any way out but to sell. But first she needs to do the last harvest and sell off the produce at the Mistletoe Fair.

Freya's only offer on the farm come from rival brothers the Hendersons, who she would rather not sell to, but may not have any choice. As the story progresses we discover she has had an interesting history with the brothers, one that I would have liked explained in greater detail than it was.

Freya has two main allies as this time, Sam, the Henderson who she doesn't hate as much as the other and Amos Fry. Amos Fry appeared randomly in the autumn, and has turned into a really good friend and helper on the farm, when Freya's boyfriend wasn't willing to do anything.

There is just something about the way Amos is described which makes me wonder if he was human, or some sort of spiritual being.

There is a countdown to mark each passing of time, and it is a countdown to Mistletoe Day, but having never heard of Mistletoe day, I would have loved an explanation as to what it is.

Merry Mistletoe is an entertaining novella, that is well written, although more details would have been nice in places, and a great snapshot into a December at a Mistletoe Farm.

This was the first of my festive reads this year and I couldn't have picked a nicer one - both in terms of story and also the cover, which I think is gorgeous and so appropriate.

According to my Kindle, this book would take about 1.5 hours to read. For a short(ish) story, it was perfectly paced and didn't feel rushed at all.

Freya has had a difficult year. This will be the first Christmas without her beloved father and money is tight, so tight in fact that she has to contemplate selling her much-loved family home, Appleyard Farm. It's just a shame that the only people interested are her neighbours, the Henderson brothers. From the animosity shown by Freya, it is clear that there is history between them and all becomes clear as the book continues. Her live-in boyfriend, Gareth, is no help at all, he just wants to sell and get his hands on the money and has no thought for Freya's feelings.

There are some lovely characters here. Firstly, there is Freya. She can be stubborn and sometimes frustrating, but I was rooting for her all the way and hoping that everything would turn out right for her. The Henderson brothers were chalk and cheese. Then there is Amos; what to say about Amos. He seems almost a magical 'fairy godfather' character. He is of no fixed abode, he prefers to sleep on the floor, and arrives at Freya's door to help with the many tasks that need to be done to keep the Farm going, especially at Mistletoe gathering time. I was never quite sure how old he was, but he was such a wonderful wise and kindly creation, gently manoeuvring people into situations for their own good - I think we all need an Amos in our lives from time to time!

The story begins 29 before Christmas and we first meet Freya when she is taking her mistletoe to sell at a fair, continuing a long-held family tradition, although this may be her last ever mistletoe sale. Freya knows that the money will run out soon and the sale of the farm has become a necessity - if only it wasn't to the Hendersons.

Emma Davies' writing has a natural and easy flow and the characters (and even the not-so-nice ones) will engage you straight away. If you want a heart-warming and festive read to curl up with on a cold afternoon then I can recommend this one. I bought Emma's first novel, *Letting in Light* ages ago and it's been languishing on my Kindle, all my good intentions of getting to it have been foiled but after enjoying this, I shall make a bigger effort to get to it sooner rather than later.
