Decent, but not groundbreaking

This book has a good premise, an interesting main character, and a lot of small issues. Overall, the story is easy to follow, but it felt like there were two separate stories instead of one.

The small issues are those that I would hope get addressed in later books, but in this book, they were an omission that could have served as a bridge between the two separate plots. One of these issues is the fact that the two secondary characters seemed useless, except as hostages. I never developed any strong feelings for either of them, so I really didn't care if they lived. This is in spite of one fact that the author dropped major hints that at least one secondary character is going to be pretty powerful. Since we never saw either secondary character do anything other than read something off the internet and make some judgment calls off of said information, and be passed out and locked up, I guess they weren't entirely useless.

The second issue is that the first antagonist was spoiled in story by the author. I don't know if this was a grammar issue, an editing mistake, or if the author forgot that she didn't introduce the first antagonist earlier. On that note, the author tells us that this antagonist has been searching for the main character for a while, but the main character is pretty oblivious about it. However, the 2nd main character found the main character

fairly easily, and then congratulated the antagonist on their magic. That is another disconnect.

The third issue is that by disregarding this antagonist so quickly, the story's plot feels disjointed, and the antagonists for part two seem unimpressive, and aren't a credible threat, even with magic.

Lastly, while the threat the main character is under becomes clear, there's not enough of a build up, or of suspense to drive it home. That was addressed in the preview of the next book, but not actively in this one.

In fact, that is the main criticism of this book that I have: not enough build-up in the right places. It was entertaining, and a fast read otherwise.

I've always been a huge fan of the Arthurian legends and magic and this has both rolled into one with a healthy dose of fantasy creatures a plenty - from trolls to werewolves to witches and wizards and even a Greek myth thrown in for good measure. I loved seeing Morgan portrayed as a hero and a good person rather than the villain (since she has always been a recognizable, strong female) she is usually characterized as (though the whole thing with Mordred and betraying Arthur seems to have gotten eliminated from this story to turn her into a good character, and plenty of thing have gotten switched and changed and it did feel like it had borrowed a bit from the BBC Merlin series, which didn't really follow the original legends either). Rather than just work forward in the modern world with the Arthurian legend shadowing the story (which it does to about a mid point), the Arthurian legend does come to the front and actively play a part in the story. My one complaint is that the book is novella length and from the writing quality, it feels like it should be a standard 300 page sized book.

Morgan's Mistake is very much inspired by the Harry Dresden series with the same amount of magic being flung around, but without quite as much hard-boiled detective noir. For the duration of reading this, it did entertain me and didn't lose my interest at any point and I will be looking into further installments of the series.
