When I first agreed to review the book, I looked at the cover and title and thought it would be chick lit. After reading the synopsis and my eyes catching on the "darkly comic tale" part, I was even more curious about what I would be reading. I am really glad the author added the word "darkly" because I probably would have been completely thrown off guard if not. This book touches on a lot of extremely sensitive subjects, like body-image issues, rape and suicide. Dot's journey was very interesting yet at times hard to read about, but I commend Lisa Souza for writing a thought-provoking and very honest novel.

This IS a genuine post, I LOVED this book!! In many ways I could relate at times to exactly what was felt by the main character

I highly recommend this book for women readers for sure!! The title & the beginning of the book make the reader think it's just a book on being a bridesmaid & the awful things that go along with that "duty" but it's not really about being the bridesmaid, but the beauty!

This story is about a young woman named Dorothy Lindell AKA Dot. The book is humorous and found myself snickering out loud at times even in inappropriate places but it was comically told, although Dot has major issues we all face esp women. I believe the author calls it "darkly comical" but I think any woman reading could identify at parts and find this really very funny

Dot starts out by going & being, in 2 weddings. The first is her cousin Ginny where she's a bridesmaid & is paired with Kennedy J, who she finds out is gay but a well distinguished "image consultant" type of a guy. They ditch their duties at the wedding to go to a gay bar where she "fits in" because they think she's a tranny. It's her first ditch at responsibility but she's having a blast. Kennedy and her agree to exchange services---she'll help him with his computer problems & he'll work in re molding her body as his "project". As she puts it--he has more work to do than she's going to have

The next wedding she's again a bridesmaid in her mother's wedding which isn't exactly her first marriage but since Dot shirked her responsibilities at her cousin's wedding, she had to make up for it at her mother's

Dot attends regular meetings at D.A.--Dater's Anonymous!! It's a small group of about 6 ppl who many play a significant part as the book progresses. Dot has poor self esteem and has always been bullied in school for being "fat" and she loves to read Barbara Cartland romance novels & works in computer business for big computer company

She finally gets tired of her mundane boring life as it is so she calls Kennedy to come in & have him "do his

thing " & make her over. One of the funniest lines I found in the book was as he's looking at her & making suggestions from head to toe he's looking at her face & when he gets to her chin he says "chins: 1 is nice, 3's a crowd"!! That line had me in stitches, just saying!! :) he makes his suggestions & the process starts. He waives his fee since she fixed his computer but she's going to have many doctor bills etc until the process is complete

Now her transformation begins!

She meets with dermatologist for her face & gets chemical peels & facials done, she sees a nutritionist who comes to her home & clears out her fridge of most everything she was eating & replaces it with foods she should eat instead. She loses 20 pounds & is finally able to get the lipo, moderate tummy tuck, thigh re sculpturing & her nose fixed all the same day. She finds herself in a predicament when she needs to have a friend drive her home after surgery & finds she really has no friends but gets a co-worker to pick her up to take her home. The co-worker that comes isn't the original person but her married co-worker who eventually ditched her once she's home & she asks him to help her take off the binding wraps that are holding her together after the surgery only to discover later there was a zipper & an easy flap for going to bathroom!! She calls her stuck up cousin to come help her, she comes over to see she was set up & calls the only number she sees on a business card which is of a girl named Elvira Wentz from her DA group. Elvira is described pretty much like you imagine Elvira , except without the chest. Goth, piercings, dresses in black & white mainly so Elvira comes over to help take care of Dot. The 2 of them find out that although they look different they both have similar problems when it comes to men & dating

So the book goes on through Dot's transformation from being fat homely lonely no friend woman, to being a woman who now has made herself over & has friends. She goes from ugly duckling to swan girl. Changes everything on herself including wanting to go by her middle name of Alana

Although the book is written comically the underlying theme to me seems to be body image. She wasn't happy the way she looked and at her job but then there was Elvira who also had her share of problems but wasn't fat. They both go through transformations plus Dot gets to know one of the men in DA a lot better. She never understood why he was in the group & didn't know what he did for a living either but he seemed to have a connection with the doctor who held the DA group meetings. It's later discovered why he's there & his occupation but I don't want to give away any spoilers. There's also another guy that knows Dot, by her middle name. Alana, a little too good also which leads to a climactic ending

The end of the book flash forwards to 7 years later, telling how Dot ends up & that she looks back & sees the faces of all the friends she really has

Although written comically , the book definitely takes the reader through self image & the obsessions we have on what's on the outside rather than the inside of us, & sometimes the lengths we'll go through to change the outside. So it may seem like just a funny story, but there are underlying issues with the women & secrets that come out also along the journey of changing themselves

A strict exercise and diet as well as hypnotism regime turns into weight loss and plastic surgery and an entire wardrobe and personal makeover. After her transformation is complete, Dot meets Jmiller and they date. Everything seems to be going well, until John introduces Dot to his best friend, who happens to also be Dot's former high school bully.

I love makeover stories; however, for a woman to put herself through hell and back just to be 'attractive' according to societal standards does grate on the back of my mind. First Thoughts: Dorothy Alana Lindell has been overweight for a while, so she decides to undergo a transformation through proper dieting, and plastic surgery mainly, rhinoplasty, and liposuction. She is rather insecure, so she does almost every possible change possible to herself and her body.

Unfortunately, a bully from her school recognizes her and off the story takes off.. I did like the concept of Beauty and The Bridesmaid, it shows a woman believing in superficial beauty, but her reasoning is mainly pressure from society. A lot of people say "It's society that's ugly, not you." Characterization: Many readers can understand Dot and even relate to her, her struggles are similar to how people like you and I might think as well. No matter how much confidence humans can achieve, there will always be some insecurities we might have. I liked Dot's character and her obsession with her physical appearance was fascinating to read about. I don't believe she mainly wanted to be pretty, but rather she wanted to be more accepted in society, since "skinny" is more accepted. The romance is decent overall, but it was mainly a miss for me - I liked the focus better solely on the female lead. I liked that Dot faced her fears - it's an admirable trait.

Plot: I liked that it's a humorous novel.. for the most part. There is "dark humor" in there as well which I didn't like too much though - It's basically a story of the "ugly ducking" turned into the beautiful swan. Beauty and the Bridesmaid did have a couple of grammatical errors which made me cringe, although, I liked that this is a woman's POV who just wants to "fit in."
