This is the second in a series, but it is easily a stand alone read. Maggie Dove and the citizens of her small town in New York are part of a complete story.

Maggie and 2 of her friends have opened a detective agency. The 3 women, Maggie, Agnes and Helen are all talented in different ways. Each of them bring those talents to the agency. But, in this story most of the actual detecting is done by Maggie.

At first they have no clients. Then Racine, a woman who has lived nearly her entire life in the village comes and asks that Maggie Dove try to keep her younger sister, Domino, from coming home.

Racine explains that Domino is evil. At first Maggie refuses to help Racine. When Maggie decides to try to prevent Domino from returning home, it is too late. Domino, Lucifer her rock star husband, Milo their 13 year old son and a young woman who evidently is close to both wife and husband all arrive in town and move into the family castle.

The plot is filled with Maggie Dove's strong faith in God and the power of good to overcome evil. Domino does present herself as a woman with a strange set of values.

There are people in town who are a part of Domino's history. Each person contributes something to the story. But, no one understands the story in its entirety.

Maggie Dove is an interesting character. Every now and then, I felt there was too much inner thought going on. She has overcome tragedy in her past and that tragedy kept her from truly participating in life for a very long time. At times, it seems that keeping herself isolated for so long held her back in her relationships.

Maggie is not a warm and cuddly person, but she inspires her friends to care about her, because no matter what, she cares about others. She has grown close Helen's little boy, Edgar. They have a mutual love for one another.

The secondary characters add a great deal to the plot. Much of the story is developed from the past. As in real life, who people are is based on who they were.

This is a story which moves the reader along at a good rate. I enjoyed it very much.

This is the second book in the Maggie Dove cozy mystery series. Maggie Dove is a 62 year old widow, who has been alone since her daughter died in a car accident 20 years ago. She has just opened a detective agency

along with two of her friends. Unfortunately, they have not had a case since opening. Their fortunes change when Racine Stern hires Maggie to discourage her sister from returning home. Racine's sister is Domino, who left town 30 years ago, married a famous rock star and is living an alternative lifestyle. When Domino arrives, it becomes apparent that she is looking for money from her and Racine's wealthy mother.

Racine becomes convinced that Domino wants to kill her, and hires Maggie to look into it. A death soon follows and Maggie begins investigating. There is a witch craft element to the death, and Maggie looks to a local coven to get answers. The beliefs of the witches is at war with Maggie's own beliefs, as she is a devout Christian and Sunday School teacher. Maggie's religious beliefs come into the story at times, but the book did not seem overly "Christian" to me.

This is an enjoyable cozy mystery. I think Maggie has become a softer, more likable person since the first book. The mystery was pretty entertaining, and the ending caught me by surprise. There are a lot of strong, female characters here, but most of them are pretty unlikable. Both Racine and her mother Simone are rude to everyone they meet. Her coworker, Agnes, has terrible mood swings that include yelling at Maggie. At times, I felt the author went out of her way to make Agnes unlikable. This is the second book in the series, but I feel it can be read and enjoyed without reading the first one. I give this book 4 out of 5 stars.

Maggie Dove is an older woman who wants to be a detective, so she starts up a Detective agency with the help of two friends, Agnes and Helen, all three of them know nothing much about being detectives. But they try! Agnes and Helen both have other jobs, but Maggie does not leave all day she stays in the store all day alone. Her first customer is a strange one, Racine Stern who lives in the Stern Manor the largest house and the richest family in town. She wants to hire Maggie to stop her sister Domino from coming back to Darby, New York. Domino left to go to California 30 years before after being disgraced by someone in their village. Sixty-two is not the usual age at which to start a new career. But then, Maggie Dove is not your usual older woman. Having solved a murder recently (in the first book in Susan Breen's series) she decides to open a detective agency. With two partners as eager as she to start solving cases, Maggie anxiously waits for clients to come through the office door -- and she waits, and waits and waits. Finally, one of the small town of Darby-on-Hudson's wealthiest residents, Racine Stern, appears on the doorstep asking for help. And Maggie turns her down, finding her request too bizarre! Her partners are understandable angry with her.

So Maggie takes on the job of confronting the recently returned Domino, the celebrity sister deemed evil by Racine. Convinced her life and her considerable inheritance are in jeopardy, Racine is shocked when her family drama takes an unexpectedly deadly turn, leaving the last person she suspected it would happen to dead. Now Maggie has to investigate first one, then a second death, as well as the complicated relationships

within the Stern family. A tarantula, a mistress, witches and Domino's rock star husband by the name of Lucifer are just some of the challenges Maggie must face.

Religiosity bogs down the story a bit at times, but when the main character is also a Sunday school teacher, that's not unexpected. Maggie delves into the goings on at a coven and Wiccan beliefs, a far cry from the church activity with which she is familiar. White witches, black witches – it's intriguing if confusing. But she cannot let herself become too sidetracked by unconventional religious practices when a very real killer may be on the loose. Or not. The deaths she's investigating may actually be accidents or even suicide. Maggie has to hope and pray that the next deadly mishap doesn't happen to her. Will her first case also be her last?

Sixty-two-year-old widow and Sunday School teacher Maggie Dove has opened a detective agency along with her two friends, Agnes and Helen. Sleepy Darby-on-Hudson does not seem to be particularly fertile ground for a detective agency and the ladies have had no clients. But when Racine Stern comes to the office with a problem, Maggie is ready to spring into action. The Stern family is the wealthiest in the village and the most reclusive. Racine has given the last 40 years of her life over to caring for her ailing mother. She is distraught that her younger sister, Domino, is returning for a visit. Domino, who married a rock star has been tabloid fodder for years. Racine says that Domino is evil, a witch, and she wants Maggie to keep her from coming. It's too late though and Domino returns with the rock star, her son, and an entourage. When Domino plummets from a balcony at the "welcome home" Halloween party she throws for herself, is it suicide, an accident or murder? There is a lot more going on in the village than Maggie ever knew, including a coven of witches.

Interestingly, I didn't especially like the character of Maggie Dove when I first met her. I found her to be overindulged and self-indulgent. Yes, she had suffered two major losses within a year of each other: her husband who was the love of her life and her much beloved daughter, the latter in a horrific car crash. But instead of moving on with her life or coming to terms with her grief, she spent 20 years moping about in a fog.

A priest once told my father that it is absolutely normal to mourn and grieve for a lost loved one. He said the

most agonizing period normally runs about a week and then the pain gradually becomes duller. It is unlikely that the sorrow will ever completely go away but it becomes manageable and, for most people, reasonably quickly. In fact, he said, after seven days it is no longer grief but indulgence. While his timetable is a bit strict, the basic thought seems to me to be a fair summation of how most humans cope.

And then there is the thing of everyone calling her Maggie Dove. Mrs. Dove, yes or Maggie, but Maggie Dove? Had this been set in the South, I would sort of understand this type of affectation, but we're in mid-state New York just north of White Plains and south of West Point, along the Hudson River. (These locations are beautifully described, by the way, and, having been in that area a number of times I have enjoyed revisiting them through the book.)

The first book in the series dealt with Maggie Dove (see! even I'm doing it!) finally coming to terms with her grief and, incidentally, solving a murder mystery. Despite my underlying antagonism to the heroine I found that I had enjoyed this well-told story and looked forward to more.

This novel continues Maggie's return to fully embracing the real world. She and her friends have formed their own detective agency and are now awaiting clients. Halloween-themed, not only does the main action occur on the actual holiday, but the subsequent investigation turns up witches and Evil.

Maggie Dove Encounters Witchcraft and Murder

After solving one murder, Maggie and her friends, Agnes and Helen, have opened their own detective agency. They know little about being detectives, but that doesn't deter them. Since both Helen and Agnes have other jobs, the task of keeping the agency running falls to Maggie.

She's alone in the office when Racine Stern, a daughter of one of the richest families in town, seeks out their services. Her sister, Domino, is planning a visit. Racine wants to pay the agency a thousand dollars if Maggie will undertake to convince Domino not to come. Domino is involved in witchcraft and other unsavory activities. Racine is afraid for herself and her invalid mother if Domino and her husband, Lucifer, come to stay.

Maggie is a strange character to be running a detective agency. She's a Sunday school teacher who has been immersed in grief for years over the death of her daughter. In this novel, she starts to come out of her shell, but she's still quite rigid in her beliefs. She turns down Racine's job because she thinks the prodigal should be welcomed home. Her partners are not so sure. In fact, Agnes is furious.

The plot focuses on dysfunctional family relationships, witchcraft and finally, murder. I find it a little difficult to see the very proper Maggie involved in stalking a killer, but the author makes it reasonably believable.

If you like cozy mysteries this is an interesting one with an unusual heroine.

This second installment with Maggie Dove has Maggie in a now-official detective capacity with two partners. The mystery has a gothic feel to it, with family secrets, witches/Wiccans, huge storms, mansions, and oddball characters. But the relationships between the characters are finely drawn--with enough range to make them believable, but not so much range there's not a sense of who each person is. The mystery and ending were satisfying for me.

I gave this one four stars instead of five (which was my rating for the original), though. Maggie Dove's character--always interesting and introspective--verged on the whiny and irritating during the first third or so of the book. Her self-awareness helps mitigate that, but I was getting tired of it nonetheless. Luckily, that eases off as the book continues, and Maggie forges ahead with real life despite decades of cocooning herself in grief over her daughter's death at 17.

Overall, I really liked it. The characters were complex, the plot worked, and I wanted to know whodunnit. So, a quite satisfying read!
